

Jabez Bailey Will Be Buried Friday

ALBANY, Feb. 23.—Funeral services for Jabez Harlan Bailey, 79, who died in Salem Tuesday evening have been set for Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Fisher-Braden chapel. Rev. Virgil Halbig will have charge of the services and burial will be in the Palestine cemetery.

Mr. Bailey was a farmer by occupation but had not worked since 1920. He was born in Randolph county, Ind., March 23, 1857, and moved to Van Buren county, Iowa in 1886. On Dec. 23, 1878, he married Anna M. Runyon. Mrs. Bailey died in 1924, and in 1933 Mr. Bailey came to Oregon where he has since resided.

Surviving are a son and daughter and one sister. The daughter is Mrs. F. H. Holmes of Longmont, Colo., and the son is M. Waldren Bailey of Route 1, Albany. The sister is Mrs. Anna Watson of Stockport, Iowa. He is also survived by three grandchildren.
