Build Walks On Big Scale

Funds Provided Partly by WPA For This and Park Project

STAYTON, Feb. 25.—Approximately 15 men are expected to start work Friday morning on grading streets in the northeast section of the town as a forerunner to building concrete sidewalks and curbs fronting a number of residential properties. The work is a part of a WPA project aggregating \$15,428 which was approved this week.

More than 5,000 feet of sidewalk has been contracted for by property owners, with indications that more applications will be received immediately. According to terms of the agreement of the WPA grant, property owners are to furnish the materials used in the construction of the walks and curbs with the government funds paying for labor.

The city council has issued a statement to property owners who contemplate improvements under the project, that it is vital that they notify Charles Porter, street commissioner, at once so that correct grades may be set. Also, the work will be grouped in districts and it will be impossible to return later to one district for small jobs after the work planned for that district has been completed. The street grading, and sidewalk and curbing project calls for the expenditure of \$6,546 in labor as no estimate for materials will be made as that cost is up to the property owners.

Improve City Park

The second project includes the improvement of the city park. Besides general beautification, bathhouse, tables and benches will be constructed. Title to the park property is now vested in the city with the transfer of the property by a local lodge several months ago. The labor cost for the park improvements have been set at \$3,067, with no definite date set when this part of the work will start, depending on when the sidewalk project has been completed.

Also included with the two projects will be the drafting of a map showing proposed sewerage system, including pipes, conduits, water mains, service lines, manholes and catch basins. The cost of this job has been estimated at \$615.
