Change in Loading Zone Is Proposed

Changing of the downtown loading zone of city bus lines from Commercial street to the south side of State street west of Commercial is the object of negotiations now going on between the city and the Oregon Motor stages.

Designed to clear up traffic congestion at the intersection of State and Commercial caused by cross traffic turns now made by the buses the plan will necessitate rerouting of the bus lines in a loop around the block bounded by Commercial, Court, Front and State.

An understanding will be reached with the bus company before the resolution requesting the change is introduced in the city council.

There will be no painting of lines designating traffic lanes until this plan is worked out.
