Interest Seen In Water Well With Oil Hint

SCIO, March 2.—Geologists and others interested in gas and oil have inquired as to the Ed Bilyeu water well near Scio, which is said to have furnished indications of these propering drilling operations ear-ly in the winter. Among inquiries received by Bilyeu, some have come from Port-land, Michigan, Denver, Texas, and elsewhere. On account of inclement weather, work was suspended at a depth of approximately 130 feet.

An adequate supply of water was Bilyeau's objective, but commercial gas or oil, or both, would be acceptable, he states. It is not known, Bilyeu stated recently, just when opera-tions will be resumed, if at all. The well is full of water at this time.
