

Dick Obeys Court For Part of Day

Suspended Jail Sentence Is Revoked as Defendant Gets Drunk Again

SILVERTON, March 2.—When Elmer Dick appeared before Judge Alf O. Nelson Tuesday morning on a drunken charge, he pleaded guilty for the sixth time to the same charge in approximately a year.

Dick was brought into Judge Nelson's court Monday morning when he pleaded guilty to drunkenness. Nelson gave him a 30-day sentence and \$100 fine and costs. As Dick, who appeared before Nelson four previous times, begged for mercy, Nelson suspended the entire sentence on condition that Dick pay costs and remain out of Silvertown for a period of one year.

W. H. Veerier, Sr., was apprehended in the act of stealing corn from M. E. DeGuire and brought before Judge Nelson Tuesday morning where he was given a 30-day jail sentence which he began serving at once. C. E. Hartford and Ed Amo made the arrests.

Interest Seen In Water Well With Oil Hint

SCIO, March 2.—Geologists and others interested in gas and oil have inquired as to the Ed Bilyeu water well near Scio, which is said to have furnished indications of these properties at various depths during drilling operations early in the winter. Among inquiries received by Bilyeu, some have come from Portland, Michigan, Denver, Texas, and elsewhere. An account of inclement weather, work was suspended at a depth of approximately 130 feet.

An adequate supply of water was Bilyeu's objective, but commercial gas or oil, or both, would be acceptable, he states. It is not known, Bilyeu stated recently, just when operations will be resumed, if at all. The well is full of water at this time.
