

McGrew Outlines **High Court Issue**

The state's rights question is the underlying factor in the present controversy over the United States supreme court, J. Fred McGrew, public speaking professor anddebate coach of Fresno State college, told the Salem State college, told the Salem Twenty-Thirty club at the meet-

ng Friday night at the Quelle. How far the federal arm should reach out over state lines is the question, McGrew, a Willamette university graduate, declared, adding he had encountered no or who could answer that question

satisfactorily. President Roosevelt has some arguments on his side, McGrew said, for spread of commerce and other factors have made state control of many issues impractical. The president's failure lies in seeing the "go" signal and not the 'stop" light in the federal constitution, said McGrew, declaring he could see the president's viewpoint but could not vote with him on this issue.
