commonly proposed is to add new judges or new courts, but it will readily be seen that if the problem is what I have stated it to be, such a so-called remedy would merely aggravate the complaint.

"There are, of course, legitimate demands for additional judicial manpower in sections where the population has grown rapidly. But it is easy to see that to add this remedy to all cases is to add to the ravages of the disease, to contribute to the confusion, and, what is profoundly important at this time, to burden still further an already seriously embarrassed taxpayer."

Wheeler slammed the volume down upon his desk and faced the senate.

"I am not simply quoting from some man who is a candidate for office," he said. "I am quoting from 'Looking Forward,' written by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1933."

The senate was visibly stirred. More testimony is given tomorrow.

Before the senate judiciary committee, Senator P. Devaney, president of the National Lawyers Guild, spoke vigorously in support of the president's proposal to add one new justice to the supreme court for each justice past 70 who fails to retire.

Senator Norris, whom many regard in an admirable position to bring about a compromise in the court conflict, because of his close friendship with the president, his popularity with his colleagues and his assertion of only conditional support for the bill—was unsparring in his criticism of the courts.

"We must not forget," he said, "that any tribunal, whether judicial or legislative, is composed of men with all the imperfections attributable to humanity. No organization, either judges or of legislators, is perfect, and the human element must, in the end, enter largely into the decision, whether made by a court or by a legislature."

whether their names are taken from the registration books, tax rolls or from other sources.

"Such is the proper course, for neither the courts nor the litigants are charged with the duty of properly selecting a jury list. That is the function of the state which should be performed by the state, and proper machinery should be adopted to insure that the most competent of the permanent citizens are placed on the list. Those so placed on the list should have the statutory qualifications of jurors.

"I am not suggesting that because a man is on the registration list and is not on the tax roll that he is not qualified to act as a juror. I am not suggesting that because a man is not on the tax roll he is not fact alone a proper juror.

"Neither am I suggesting that the jury list be drawn from either source to the exclusion of the other. I am firm in the conviction, however, that from whatever sources jurors are drawn the same should be used throughout the state and be uniform in all of the courts and that the legislature should provide that the most competent of the permanent citizens of the county shall be chosen for jurors as in the command of the organic law, the constitution."
