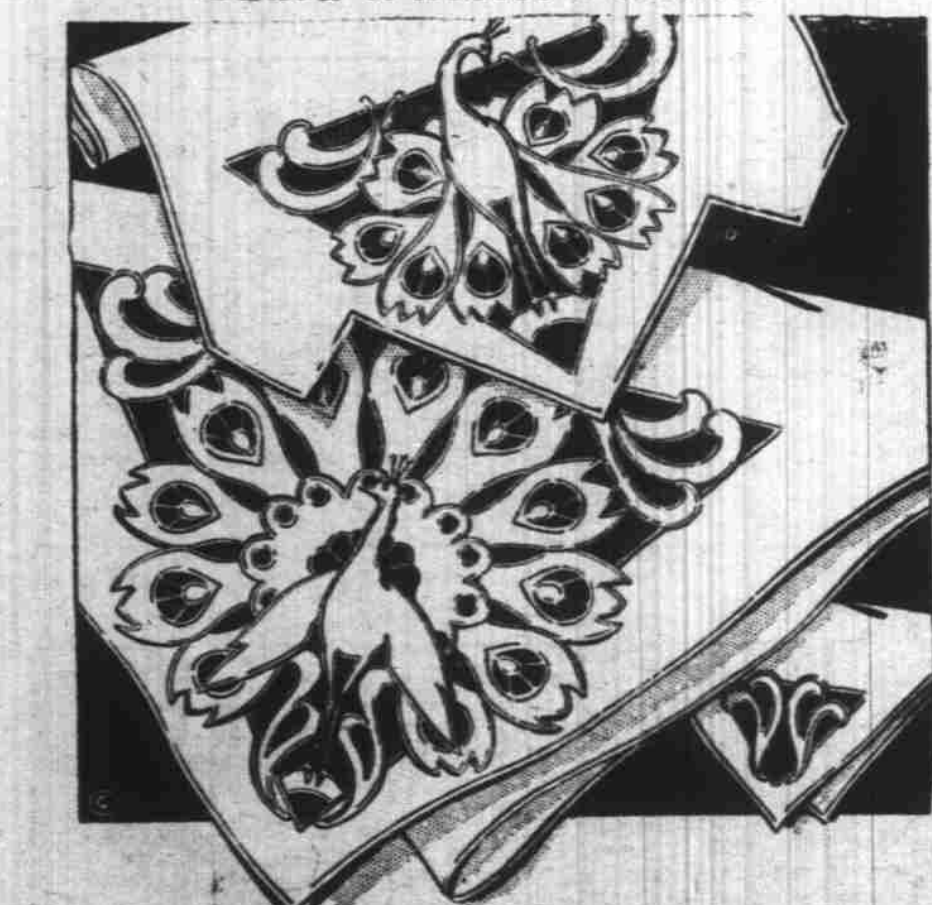

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Covered Dishes Make Almost Whole Meal

WITH all the "covered dish" luncheons and dinners listed in the society columns of local papers, there must be some mighty good casserole recipes flying around among the women who prepare the meals. Large casserole recipes can always be cut down for family size meals, and many of the favorites are really delightful for main dinner dishes.

Tuna-onion pie is a crusty recipe, suitable for either family or club meals. Here is the recipe cut down to serve 6 persons, but it might be made larger again for a number of servings.

TUNA-ONION PIE
4 tablespoons butter
1 onion
1/2 cup milk
1 1/2 cups boiling water
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup chopped celery
3 hard cooked eggs
1 large can tuna
pepper to taste
2 chicken or beef bouillon cubes

Melt butter in saucepan, add diced onion, cook until clear. Add flour, seasonings and bouillon cubes dissolved in boiling water. Stir until thick, add milk and other ingredients in layers in a casserole, cover with baking powder biscuits and bake 25 minutes in a 400-degree oven.

Served with a crisp salad, a fruit dessert and a beverage, this casserole makes the whole meal.

Onion enthusiasts will appreciate sandwiches made of sliced white onions and dill pickles. This combination is recommended only for those who plan a quiet evening at home.

COFFEE SOUFFLE
1 cup coffee
4 tablespoons flour
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup sugar

Combine coffee, sugar, flour and butter, add beaten yolks and fold in whites last. Put in a buttered pan, set in a pan of water and cook 25 degrees for about 45 minutes until egg is set.

FUDGE MADE BETTER WITH SALT NUTS

The secret of creamy fudge is said to be whipping the candy when the syrup becomes thoroughly cold. Long, slow beating produces greater creaminess and eliminates much of the sugary consistency.

Salted nuts are an added bit of goodness for the fudge. The salt, especially on almonds, takes away much of the sweetness.

Tomatoes are getting a bit bigger and somewhat lower in price so they will soon be the chief salad ingredient. Stuffings are many, and any combination of vegetables goes nicely as a filler.

The combination of cabbage and peanuts is one that has proven popular in many communities and salted nuts are best. A mixture of shrimp, crab and cabbage is another favorite.
