

Cougars Crash Through in Second Half to Eliminate Huskies

Battle Is Tied Up Four Times

Carlson's Shot Clincher; Webfoots to Play at Pullman Monday

SEATTLE, March 12—(AP)—Washington State Cougars, with a brilliant finish, defeated the Washington Huskies, 36 to 33, here tonight and won the right to meet the University of Oregon for the basketball championship of the northern division, Pacific coast conference.

Half-time score was: Washington 23, Washington State 14. The Cougars' sensational rally in the second half brought 7,500 spectators to their feet with yells that made the pavilion rattle.

With the score tied at 32 and less than four minutes left, Clyde Carlson banked the ball in from the side and clinched the game for the Cougars.

Washington State's win eliminated the Huskies from the northern division playoff. Oregon will play at Pullman Monday night to determine which team meets Stanford, southern division winner, for the Pacific coast title.

Tied Four Times
Ed Lovrich, husky right forward, led the scoring with 12 points. Ivar Nelson, Cougar center, scored seven.

In the first period, it was Washington's game both on passing and shooting, but after the between-period rest, Coach Jack Priel's boys came out an entirely different team and in no time were catching up on Washington.

The turning point in the game came in the last seven minutes when the Cougars tied the score at 30 and then took the lead.

Washington tied it at 32 before Washington State pounded into the home stretch.

Lewis Lang, 76, Called by Death

STAYTON, March 12—Lewis Lang, 76, died at a Salem hospital following a major operation. Funeral rites will be Saturday or Monday, pending arrival of a daughter from Arizona.

Lewis Lang was born in Pontiac, Italy, April 10, 1860, of French and Swiss parentage. He came to America at the age of 7 years, settling in Wisconsin, but later removing to Nebraska. December 27, 1885, he married Mary Maria Williams of Detroit, Michigan, and five years later came to Oregon. He was a member of the old Oregon National Guard, company A, second regiment, of Whiteaker, Oregon.

He is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Rena M. Tate, of Sublimity, Mrs. Lois E. Burch of Salem, Mrs. Etta E. Vorsheth of Salem, and Mrs. Rose M. Hicks, of Phoenix, Arizona; and two sons, Frederick W. of Macleay, and Joseph L. of Victor Point. One son and his wife preceded him in death. Interment is to be in the Union Hill cemetery, according to tentative plans.

McGilchrist Tells Ireland Situation

The Irish Free State made a grave error, financially at least, in breaking away from Great Britain, William McGilchrist, sr., said Friday night in a talk before the Salem 20-30 club in which he described conditions as he found them on his recent trip to the British Isles.

Singing Lifts Spirits of Prisoners in Polk's Jail

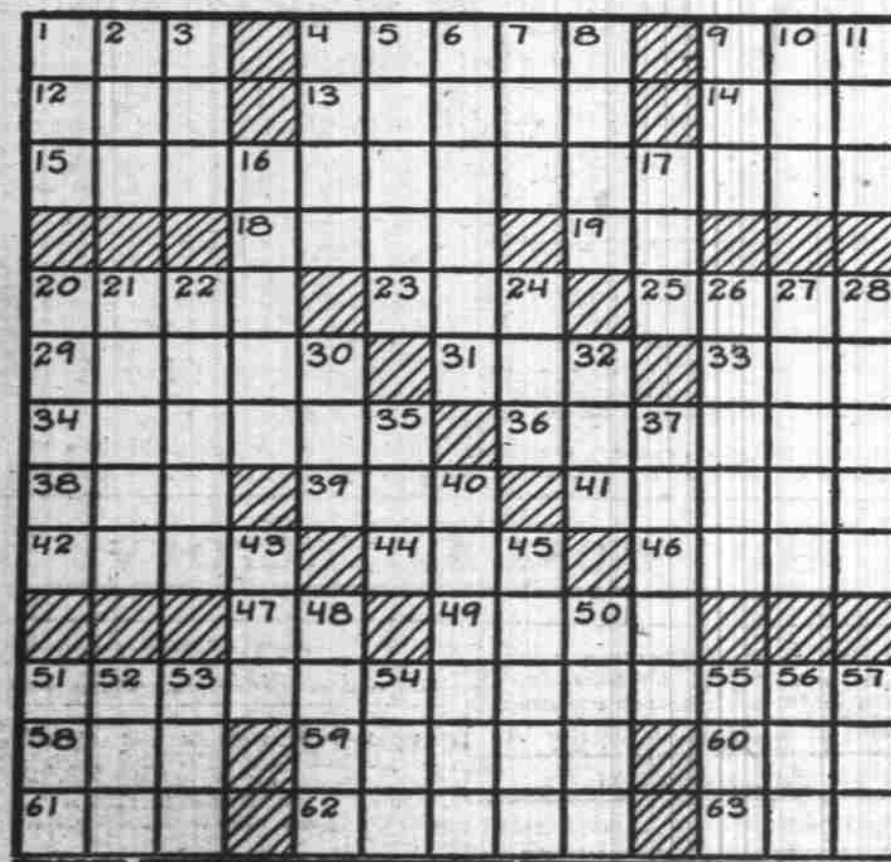
DALLAS, March 12—(AP)—The Polk county jail here may be full, but the prisoners fall to be downhearted.
