ly last night by a unanimous vote adopting the three-year reduced rate contract which the light committee worked out last week at a meeting with power company officials. The contract reduces the street light power rate by 8.16 per cent to make an annual saving of \$1456.

In adjourning the councilmen agreed to reconvene April 15 to receive bids being advertised for today for pipe to go into the 12th street cross-town arterial water main. The bids are expected to approach the \$100,000 mark due to recent sharp rises in prices.

Pledge Protection Along Pipeline Route
Rural avenue residents who recently became afraid heavy damage would be done in the laying of that section of the Salem-Stayton pipeline received assurance from the council and Mayor V. E. Kuhn of the special water committee that every effort would be made to protect trees, shrubs and rockeries.

"It is not the intent of the water commission to destroy anything that it is possible to save," the mayor explained to Edward Majek, who spoke to the council for himself and L. V. Benson, Rural avenue property owners. Majek declared that the city should replace valuable walnut trees which he believes will be destroyed by the pipeline project.

The Salem school board's plan to widen D street from Capitol to 14th and pave 14th from D to B streets was started on its way by the council by adoption of an approving resolution. The school district owns within 200 of one-half the property frontage involved.

Among other actions taken were the following:

Approval of contract for Willson park summer band concerts; referral to committees of a petition for a street light at Fawc and East Nob Hill street, a protest against a proposed Southern Pacific bus track on the east side of Winter street, proposals to improve Bush and Owens streets immediately east of Commercial, and a suggested change in the course of the new D street storm sewer.

License Is Revoked

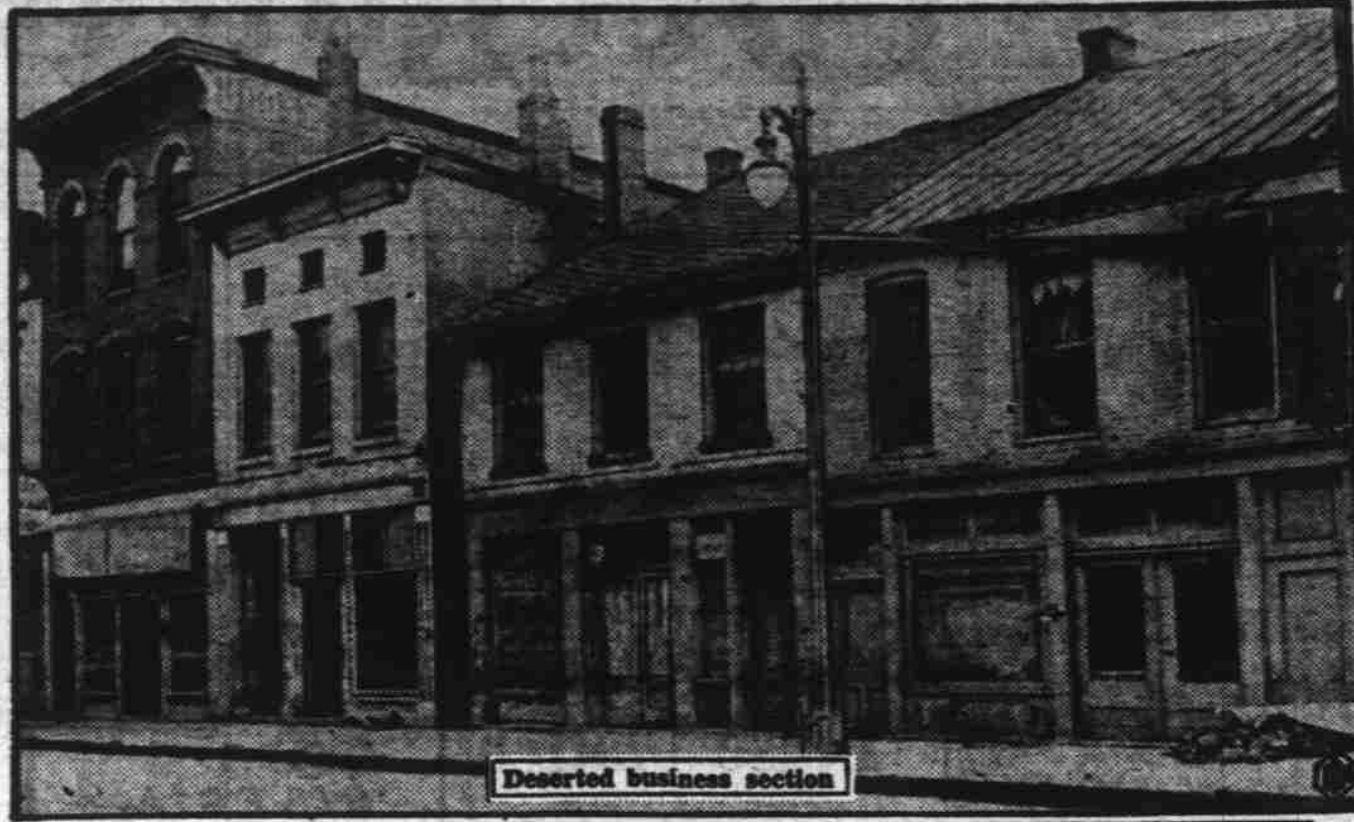

ment of the four weeks old dispute, which would end at least \$5,000 wage premiums back to their posts, was reliably reported to be "a matter of hours."

Pay increases aggregating \$2,000,000 annually were granted 20,000 workers in the pottery industry. The United States Pottery Manufacturers' association announced the wage boost, ranging from 9 to 15 per cent, would affect 24 factories in the east and middle west.

Pressed into an early vote on a substitute amendment to the coal bill presented by Senator Byrnes (D., S. C.), the senate rejected it after pointed remarks. The amendment, replacing Byrnes' original and less direct one, called sit-down strikes "illegal and contrary to public policy."

The sit-down strike question occupied the house too. Representative Hoffman (R., Mich.) introduced a bill to make the maneuver illegal where it affected interstate or foreign commerce, and to force unions in those fields to register with the labor department and observe certain rules of conduct.

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License Renewal To Be Simplified

New forms, simplified office procedure and an efficient field force will be coordinated in the renewal of drivers' licenses for the two years period beginning July 1, Secretary of State Snell announced Monday.

Issuance of drivers' licenses for the next two years period will start June 15. There are now approximately 405,000 of these licenses in the state.

Snell said one change in the method of issuing these licenses would save the state between \$400 and \$500 in printing costs.

Blanks for license renewals will be available in May, Snell said.

Pinball Petitions Found Sufficient

PORTLAND, April 5.—(AP)—Checking crews today stopped their work of examining names of registered voters on the referendum petitions against Commissioner J. E. Bennett's ordinance on slot machines and pinball games when the number of names reached 13,328. The council will hold up the ordinance until the next election in May, 1938. The required number of good names to halt the ordinance is 12,145.

Potato Study at Klamath Sought

WASHINGTON, April 5.—(AP)—Rep. Walter M. Pierce of La Grande, Ore., said today the Oregon congressional delegation would seek authorization for a potato experiment station at Klamath Falls, Ore.

Pierce said there is "an immediate need" for the station because of the prevalence of "root knot" in the potato fields. He estimated \$1,000 would be required for the work.

Tax for Advertising of Seaside Frowned Upon, State Bond Commission

The state bond commission frowned Monday on a proposal by the city of Seaside to levy a business tax for advertising purposes. "This would be against public policy," Governor Charles H. Martin said.

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Pair Happily Wed For Two Decades Take Vows Again

Miller B. Hayden as Salem justice of the peace yesterday performed a marriage ceremony for Rukichi Ninomiya and Yaemo Emi, Brooks farmer and his wife, who were first married more than 20 years ago and have lived happily together ever since. The second ceremony was necessary because the Ninomiyas could not show proof to immigration officials of their having been wedded in their native land, a requirement which had to be met before their 19-year old son could be admitted to the United States.

Disposal Issue at Silvertown Viewed

Many Visitors But Quorum Lacking; Cannery Will Need Outlet, Held

SILVERTON, April 5.—Visitors who turned out tonight at the city council's regular meeting night in expectation of something exciting were sadly disappointed because a quorum of councilmen failed to show up and the meeting had to be postponed until Tuesday night.

A tension in city affairs recently has focused the eyes of the city on council meetings and seldom is there a meeting night without visitors. Monday night was no exception. More visitors than councilmen were present. Absent councilmen were Otto Legard, John Porter and A. W. Green.

No regular business was transacted but informal discussion of the proposed sewage disposal plant was held with G. B. Robinson of Portland who has been making a survey at the request of the city, present to explain the part of the survey completed.

Roy Wallin of the Silvertown cannery was also present and informally explained the need of a sewage outlet from the cannery if the present operations are to be continued. Last summer 180,000 cases were put up here and Mr. Wallin explained, the cannery plans to put up at least 200,000 this coming summer but the overflow of the water from the cannery must be taken care of. State health authorities insist upon this, he said. During the past season 200 men were employed at the cannery during the peak of the season. It is expected more will be employed next year if the water overflow can be properly cared for.

No action was taken on any of the matters. Tuesday night's meeting will be an extremely full session, according to Mayor W. H. Moffett.
