was she who locked the door to McMahan's court room, but she declared the judge's session with the jurors was not strictly secret. Four early-arriving spectators were permitted to remain in the court room, she said.

Statement Given Out by Carson

Carson issued the following written statement during the course of an interview:

"I have reliable information that on Monday last, in conducting a certain proceeding unknown to the law, but called by him 'My Jury School,' McMahan caused the door of the Marion County Circuit courtroom, for the first time in its history, to be tightly locked against all the public, and thereupon gave secret 'instructions' to the Marion County jurors called for the April, 1937, term of court. 'Section 10, Article I of the Constitution of Oregon, adopted in 1859, provides:

"No court shall be secret, but justice shall be administered openly and without purchase, completely and without delay, and every man shall have remedy in due course of law for injury done him in his person, property, or reputation."

"One might ask why McMahan considered it necessary thus to violate the Constitutional mandate of the people and to affront decency, and in the doing of it, to put honorable citizens of this county who are on that jury in a false light. There is no excuse, however, McMahan's conduct, from foul odor, if not suspicion.

"No judge in the past, this side of Russia, ever has been guilty of such gross misconduct. It is an assault upon the very fountainhead of public justice."

"One hears much about attempts 'to pack the court.' What about this?"

Last Word Gained By Man After All

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6.—(AP)—For five days Joseph J. Gillen, 65, a gentle and white-haired, on a jury with 11 women and heard evidence in a trial of 10 WPA workers charged with peace disturbance.

The jury retired and two hours later announced it had reached a verdict, "guilty as charged."

A defense lawyer insisted on an individual poll of each juror on the guilt of each defendant. The eleven women all answered "guilty."

Then came Gillen's turn. He answered: "Not guilty."

The judge stared in amazement. "It was this way, Judge," Gillen finally explained: "I was the only one who voted not guilty and these women said I would have to stay there all night. I didn't want to stay there all night with these women and argue."

The court ruled the jury had disagreed and said a new trial date would be announced.

Grand Jurors to Gather Thursday

District Attorney Lyle J. Page announced yesterday he was calling the grand jury into session at 10 a. m. Thursday with plans to complete the business before it by the end of the week. Page said he hoped to obtain a final report from the jury Saturday.

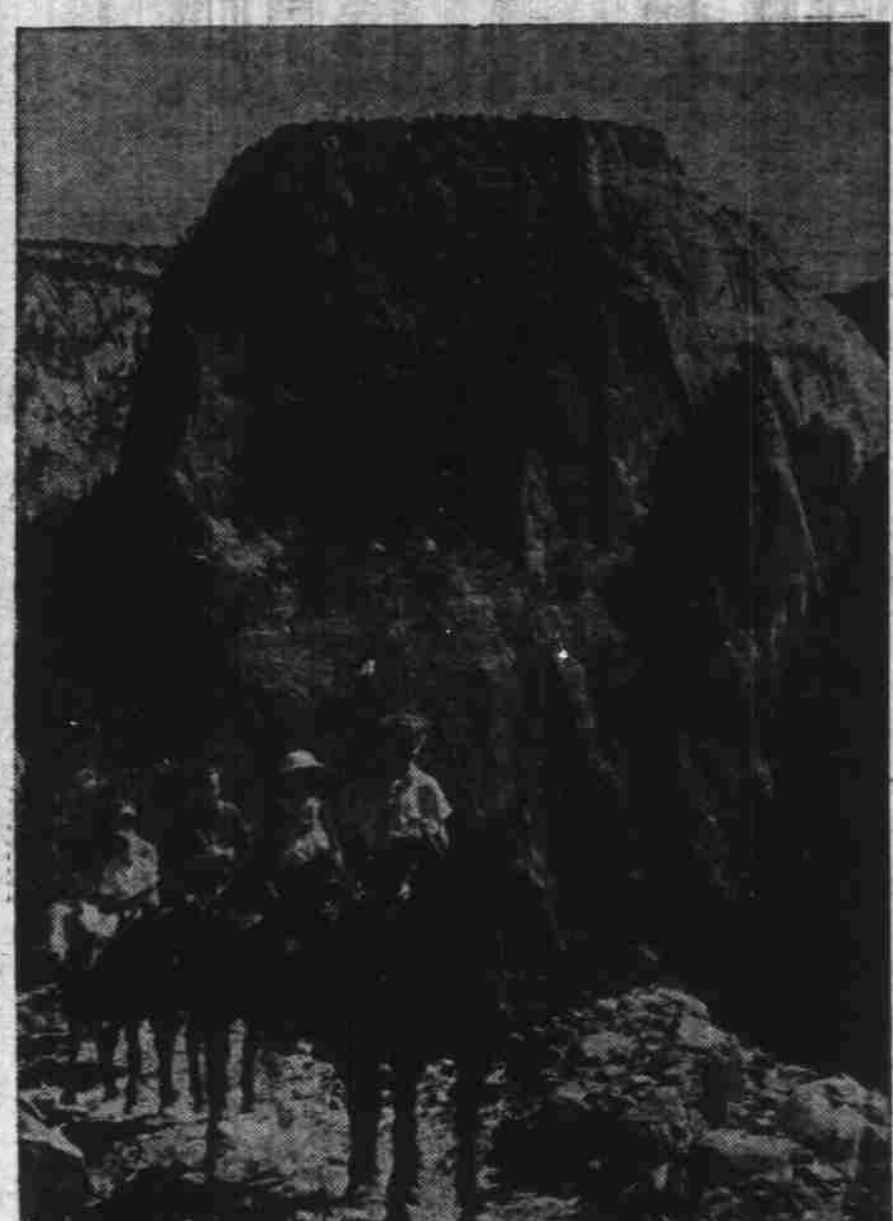

Births Ahead of Deaths in Month

Marion county's birth rate outdid the death rate during the month of February, according to a report issued yesterday by the Marion county department of health.

There were 88 births in the county during February and 76 deaths. There were 170 births and 162 deaths in the first two months of the year.

The two sexes divided honors in births with 44 of each sex being born but of the deaths 51 were male and 25 female.

Among causes of death, heart disease was credited with 23 deaths, cancer and apoplexy each 7, kidney disease 6, diabetes 1 and automobile accident 1. Non-residents who died in state institutions totaled 69.

Budget of Utility Office Is Limited

Drastic reductions in operating costs rather than increases in rates, will be necessary to offset the \$136,000 lopped off the budget of the state utility department by the last legislature, commissioner N. G. Wallace yesterday informed Governor Charles H. Martin.

Wallace said defeat of the so-called master tariff bill reduced his funds materially.

Part of the loss will be made up, Wallace said, through increased fees received from motor carriers under the state transportation act. This increase, due to better business conditions, aggregates approximately \$3000 a month over a year ago.

Wallace said the remainder of the cut would be made through reductions in operating costs.

Motors Strike Reaches Close

Collective Bargaining Is Promised Auto Union But No Monopoly

its provisions made public then. However, a few minutes after that hour he distributed copies of the pact to newspapermen and explained it to them before the signing had taken place.

A summary of the principal provisions follows:

1. The Chrysler corporation recognizes the United Automobile Workers of America as the collective bargaining agency of its members who are employed by the firm, promises to "not interfere" with employees joining the union nor discriminate against members. It promises also it "will not aid, promote or finance any labor group or organization" or any other union which might "undermine" the United Automobile Workers.

2. The U.A.W.A. agrees that "neither it nor its members will intimidate or coerce employees" and also not "to solicit members on corporation time or plant property."

3. The union agrees to prevent U.A.W.A. picket lines in the corporation's plants while the agreement is in effect. That is until next March 31.

4. The corporation agrees to "reemploy as rapidly as possible the employees now on strike." They will return to "their usual work without discrimination against them for participating in the strike, and in accordance with the seniority rules of the corporation now in effect."

5. Both parties agree to take steps to wipe out litigation pending over the strike.

Search For Irwin Wholly Fruitless

NEW YORK, April 6.—(AP)—Every detective in New York City hunted in vain today for 29-year-old Robert Irwin, blond, quint-eyed sculptor and divinity student, named by police in the killing of the Gedeon, her mother, and the English waiter who roomed in their apartment.

All day long, police cars dashed away from headquarters, running down anonymous telephone calls, and the entire force, bolstered by 18,000 patrolmen, carried on the search.

In Atlantic City, N. J., police sought a man who registered at a hotel there March 30, two days after the attractive 29-year-old model and her mother were strangled to death Easter Sunday in a five-room flat on Beekman Hill. A resident in the hotel said the man looked like photographs of Irwin.

In Lancaster, Pa., a man was arrested who also resembled the wanderer, who underwent mental treatment for three years before entering St. Lawrence university divinity school last fall.

Mrs. Nellie Glass Called by Death

Salem friends and relatives were saddened to learn of the sudden passing of Mrs. Nellie Fullerton Glass at her home in San Francisco on March 30.

Mrs. Glass' parents were Charles and Cornelia Fullerton, well known early day residents of Salem. Mr. Fullerton was a pioneer of the 1846 immigration. Mrs. Glass was born Salem and grew to young womanhood here.

She is survived by her husband, Henry Glass, and daughter, Mrs. Cornelia Burdick, both of San Francisco, and several brothers and sisters. Salem relatives are Miss Ines Fullerton, niece, and cousins, Mrs. Velleda Osmart, Mrs. A. N. Bush, J. F. Hughes and H. F. Smith.

Beer Dealers Get Additional Period

To Decide Whether Retail or Wholesale; Wine War Reported

PORTLAND, April 6.—(AP)—The state liquor commission today set May 15 as the last date on which firms can engage in both the wholesale and retail liquor trade, but announced no further joint permits would be issued.

Dealers were to have notified the commission today under which license they intended to operate, the last legislature having illegalized wholesalers engaging in the retail trade, effective June 8.

The commission refused a request for extension of the time in which unpermitted beer, outlawed by the legislature, could be sold, pointing out the act carried an emergency clause and was effective immediately.

Liberalizing Denied

Requests for loosening the regulations under which beer parlors can put on entertainment for patrons were also refused.

Reports of a "wine war" resulted in a number of distributors being summoned before the board. "We raised our prices at the request of the retail industry," McMahan told them. "Whatever you do is all right with us, but if there is going to be a price cut, please advise us and we will act accordingly."

It was reported to the commission that some dealers had sold as low as 33 cents a quart since a minimum price of 50 cents was agreed upon several months ago.

time) today by searchers aboard a rescue plane piloted by Maj. A. D. Smith, veteran executive of Transcontinental & Western Air, Inc.

Although there were no marks of identification visible, Major Smith and others of his party held no doubt the scattered ruin was all that remained of a 21-passenger Douglas airliner, missing since it left Burbank, Calif. airport Saturday morning.

Because of "bumpy" air conditions, it was impossible for the rescue ship to approach close enough to sight the bodies, if any, within the wreck. But there were no tracks in the surrounding snow, nor any other sign of life.
