Clergymen's Day, in Celebration of Mt. Angel College's Golden Jubilee Is Held; Secular Event Next Month

MT. ANGEL, April 7.—The first of the three-day celebration of the golden jubilee of Mt. Angel college and seminary was held Tuesday, the transferred date of the Feast of St. Benedict. The day was known as clergymen's day as it was a gathering of a great number of the priests of the north-west, who received their education at Mt. Angel seminary. The secular aspect of the jubilee will be held May 30 and 31 in conjunction with the annual commencement exercises and alumni banquet.

The Most Rev. Charles D. White, D. D., bishop of Spokane, preached the sermon at the pontifical high mass sung by Rt. Rev. Abbott Thomas of Mt. Angel. His Excellency, Archbishop Edward D. Howard, D. D., of Portland, who had been asked to preach, could not attend because of being called east by the illness of his sister.

Early Banquet Speaker
Rev. Joseph Heesaker of Woodburn was toastmaster at the banquet held at noon in the abbey dining hall. He introduced Abbot Thomas who gave the address of welcome; Father Early, the principal speaker on the program; Rev. George P. Thompson of Portland, representing the diocesan clergy; Abbot Lambert, president of St. Martin's college; Father Vincent, O.S.B., rector at Mt. Angel; Msgr. Day, Mt. Angel alumnus; Bishop White; and Abbot Bernard, O.S.B.

The day's speakers dwelt on the struggles and success of the community at Mt. Angel, Benedictine history and tradition, and the needs to be filled by monks in the northwest today.

Music for divine services was Gregorian chant directed by Rev. Victor Ressler of Mt. Angel. Rev. Luke Eberle of Mt. Angel played the organ. Musical entertainment after the banquet was furnished by the school orchestra under the leadership of Alexander Eshbach, lay professor of Mt. Angel college.

First Summer School Under Institute Of Marine Biology to Open June 21

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, April 7.—The initial summer session to be held by the institute of marine biology, supervised by the state board of higher education, at Coos head, nine miles from North Bend, is scheduled for June 21 to July 30, according to Dr. E. L. Packard, OSC dean of science and director of the institute.

Because of its central location, this camp affords nature lovers a chance to study numerous land, marine and fresh water plant animal organisms living under a wide range of environmental conditions.

The resident staff, headed by Dean Packard, will include Dr.

Ethel I. Sanborn, associate professor of botany, O. S. C., and Dr. Harry B. Yocom, professor of zoology, University of Oregon. Members on the associate staff will be Dr. Nathan Fasten, head of the zoology department, O. S. C.; Arthur S. Einarson, associate biologist, United States biological survey, O. S. C.; R. E. Dimick, head of the O. S. C. fish and game management department; Dr. Olof Larzell, professor of anatomy, U. of O. medical school; Dr. A. R. Moore, research professor of physiology, U. of O.; Dr. C. E. Owens, head of the botany and plant pathology department, O. S. C.; and Dr. W. W. Wells, associate professor of science, Southern Oregon Normal school.
