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Aldrich Claim Answer Filed

No Agreement By Jones to Turn Over Property, Is Heirs' Contention

Claims of Lucille Aldrich that the late T. B. Jones before his death had agreed to give her a stated share in his \$300,000 estate were denied by Ladd & Bush Trust company, executor, and the 14 Jones heirs in an answer filed in circuit court yesterday to the suit recently instituted by the woman.

The defendants' answer admits that Lucille Aldrich was acquainted with Mr. Jones early in 1935 and that she drove his car, attended to minor business affairs and prepared special diets for him but denies there was any agreement whereby she was to receive income from Salem business property and title to land in Wallowa county. She was fully paid for her services, the answer asserts.

Trial of the case of Ladd & Bush vs. Bartnik, administrator and former administrator, respectively, of the Christian Engine estate, was deferred yesterday when Judge L. H. McMahon was unable to be at the courthouse on account of illness and Judge L. G. Lewelling disqualified himself because of having previously heard Engle estate matters on appeal from probate court at Albany. A probate order was issued yesterday approving the semi-annual report of Ladd & Bush showing \$2058.89 received and \$147.36 paid out in the Engle estate administration.

The unusual sight of two crews of firemen engaged simultaneously in fighting two separate downtown fires was witnessed by stay-up-late folk in Salem Sunday morning. Either of the fires might have grown to serious proportions.

Fire which broke out in the basement of the Salem Shoe shop, 133 South Liberty, was confined to the basement while a burning mattress in a room in the Oregon building was quickly extinguished.

The fire on South Liberty street occupied the fire department for over an hour after an alarm was received at 1:58 and the alarm from the Oregon building was received while firemen were still working to extinguish the more serious blaze, only about a block away.

Some furniture and other goods stored in the basement of the shoe shop were destroyed and there was also some damage from smoke and water in the shoe shop.

Peace Talks Will Be Heard Tonight

Ray McKaig and Dr. Taylor Speakers, Presbyterian Church at 7:45 P. M.

An Emergency Peace Campaign meeting will take place tonight at the Presbyterian church, North Summer and Chemeketa streets, which will have as speakers two nationally known workers for peace, Dr. L. Wendell Taylor, of Olympia, Wash., and Ray McKaig, chairman of the Idaho state grange. Starting time for the program, which is open to the public, is 7:45 p. m.

Dr. Taylor, who is pastor of Olympia's United churches, is a forceful and colorful speaker for the cause of peace, according to reports from cities where he has already addressed thousands during the two-year peace campaign. A native of Michigan, he served more than two years in the field artillery and balloon corps during the World war. He has spent four years as a missionary in India, and has held three different pastorates on the Pacific coast. He is a student of world affairs, and is keenly interested in keeping America out of war, and war out of the world.

Mr. McKaig will speak as a farmer, having followed that occupation before becoming a member of the national grange executive committee and chairman of the Idaho state grange. His message is expected to be of particular interest to members of rural communities and farmers. He has made a careful study of neutrality problems in the World war.

Tonight's program will open with a short musical prelude, including an organ number played by Frank E. Churchill, vocal solo by Mrs. Mary Hughes and group singing led by William Wright. Dr. James E. Milligan, pastor of the First Methodist church, will offer the invocation.

Grand Jury Holds Report; No Judge
For lack of a judge to receive its reports, the Marion county grand jury adjourned yesterday afternoon until early next week. Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon was confined to his home with an attack of grippe.
