Gloves have a flare for color this season, as displays in local shops will prove. Fabrics are even prettier than in previous years, and certainly cut the glove budget down to a minimum, without sacrificing any of the attractiveness desired in good glove styling.

There's an impressive array of color names offered in fabric gloves, too, and they are all supposed to wash if care is exercised. The coronation colors are to be found; ruby, emerald, crown gold, royal blue, and there are red earth, navy, brown, black and of course white.

Many of the suede finish fabric gloves are hand stitched, some come in a silk mesh to match the same brand of mesh hose, some are woven with a sort of rib on the order of gabardene and will look very attractive with summer clothes.

Leathers continue as popular material for gloves, there are many attractive kinds. One Spanish like colored glove comes with green saddle stitching, is short and slit about half an inch down the back. Chamoise finish hand stitched gloves are very short, with a twisted leather edge for decoration. This very short type glove is especially good to wear with suits.

For sports we still have pigskin, in natural, brown, gray, navy and black. Doeskin is a washable offering that comes in both natural and white, the only ornamentation is a wide hand-sewed hem.
