They found hotel life in Tokyo luxurious. Observing the Japanese celebrating their New Year's festivities was a colorful event. An item of special interest was a nose-guard worn by many Japanese which the travelers concluded must be some sort of protection against the spread of colds.

From Tokyo their itinerary took them to a southern port of Japan where they observed native men, women and children load the ship with coal in bucket-brigade fashion.
