

Langley Is Named For Parole Board

Succeeds Trece; Post of Utter Unfilled; Other Appointments Made

Preparatory to leaving for Washington, D. C., on his power junket, Governor Charles H. Merriam made a number of appointments Thursday, chief among them being the selection of Lotus Langley of Portland to succeed W. H. Trece of Portland on the state parole board.

No appointment was made to the place on the parole board held by Dr. Floyd Utter of Salem, whose resignation was made public simultaneously with that of Trece several weeks ago. The governor's action relieving Trece of parole duties was taken in view of the latter's recent selection for a position on the capitol reconstruction committee.

The governor also announced appointment of the five members of the Oregon commission for the celebration of the sesquicentennial of the constitution of the United States:

John S. Hodgkin, La Grande; W. A. Leach, Portland; Frank Jenkins, Klamath Falls; C. C. Carlson, Portland, and Merle Chessman, Astoria.
