**Blackberry Men Will Form Agreement; Logans Wait Till '38**

Blackberry growers in Washington expect to have a control board set up early next week. George H. Walker, prominent grower in that state, has advised W. J. Linfoot, who has been active in the blackberry control movement for Oregon and is an officer of the logan control board. Packers in Washington do not altogether like the idea of the control board, Walker writes, and adds that he believes the loganberry growers are also lined up for market control.

In a letter to Roy Miller, Monmouth blackberry grower, who with Linfoot and a number of other Oregon growers attended a meeting of berrymen in Longview recently, Walker has written that the Washington growers had never seen a contract in which the price was stated until
