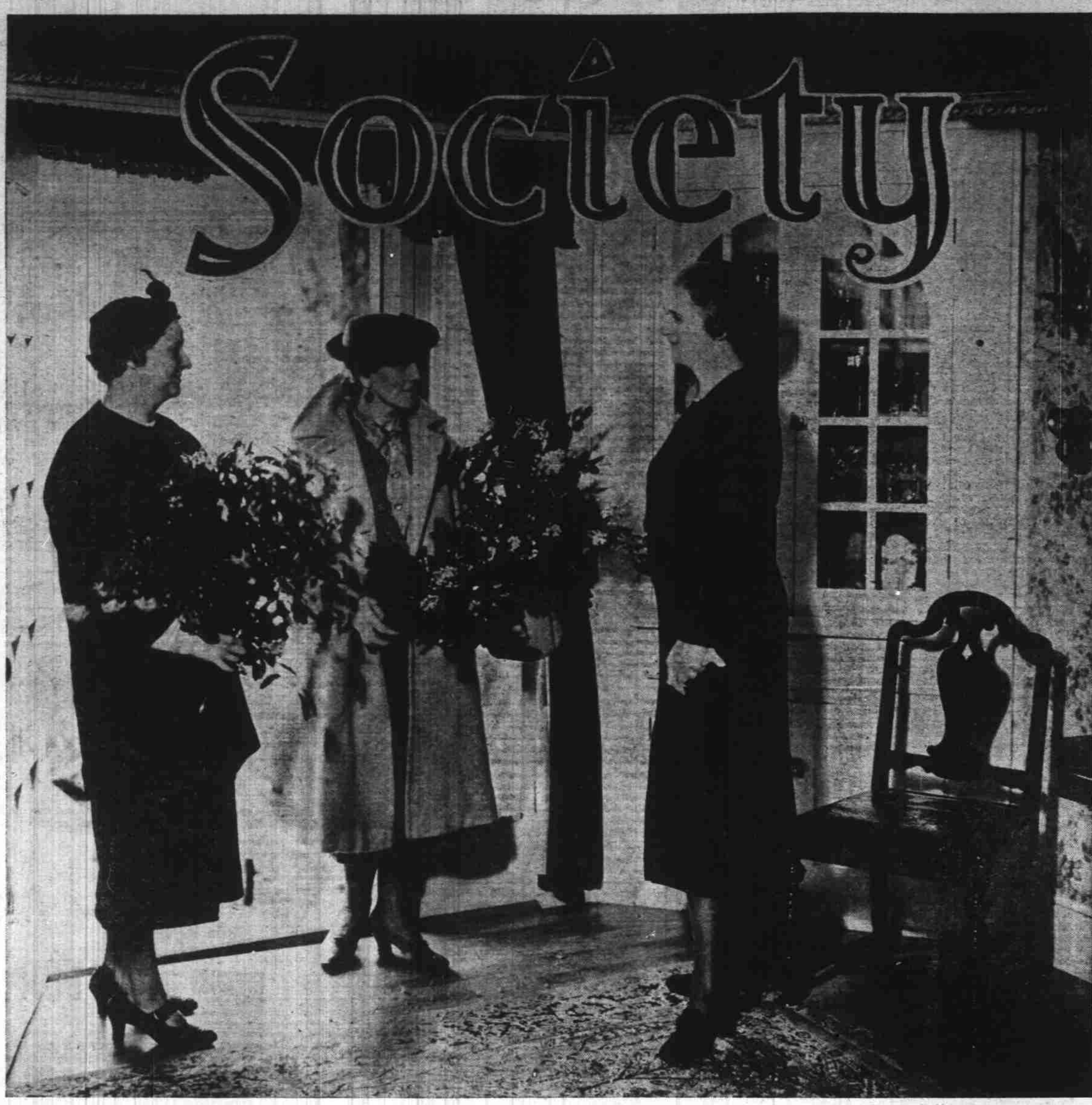


Subscription Dance Gay Affair
