New Mill Will Have 35,000 Feet Capacity; to Tap **Best Linn Timber**

The capacity of the mill will be 35,000 feet per day and the logs will be brought from Foster, Lacomb and Berlin, where the finest stand of timber in Linn county will be tapped.
