

# New Lumbering Operation Near Lebanon to be Active Soon

## Sawmill to Be Working Soon

### New Mill Will Have 35,000 Feet Capacity; to Tap Best Linn Timber

LEBANON, April 17.—J. W. MacDonald, John Ritter and George Horner are installing machinery, bought in Portland this week, in their sawmill recently erected on the Santiam highway 10 miles from Lebanon and Sweet Home. The capacity of the mill will be 35,000 feet per day and the logs will be brought from Foster, Lacombe and Berlin, where the finest stand of timber in Linn county will be tapped.

The Fir Grove sawmill owned and operated by MacDonald will continue sawing and selling lumber.

Mr. MacDonald has a wide experience in the lumber industry of the northwest and before coming here operated in Canada and Michigan.

J. E. Estep, realtor, and Barney's Radio Service will occupy the new building being erected for Bert Cotton on Main street. Mr. Estep reports the realty business as concouring.
