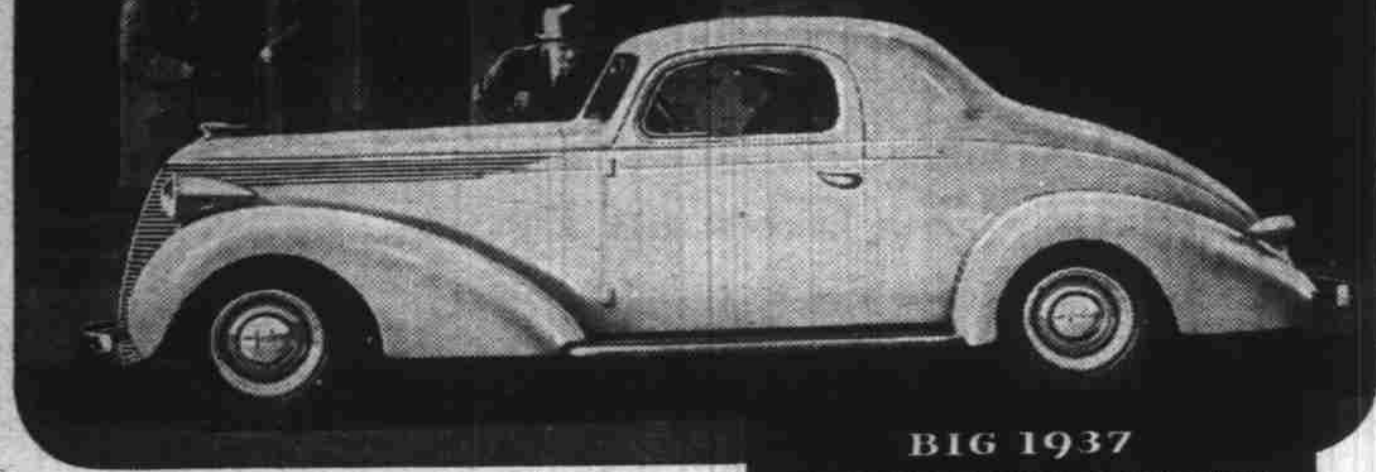

Calories Required Are Determined

In a recent booklet put out by the Fleischmann Yeast company, there appears an item of special interest to those who wish to reduce and those who hope to retain the same weight. This tells how to determine the calories needed to gain, lose or remain the same.

First determine your ideal weight from an authoritative chart, multiply this figure by 15 if you are moderately active, by 20 if you are very active. The resulting figure is the approximate number of calories required daily for your ideal weight. To lose about 1/4 of a pound a week, the booklet says to cut 400 to 500 calories a day, this is the reducing quota.

For example a moderately active woman whose weight should be 120 pounds but with an actual weight of 150 should multiply the 120 pounds by 15 and get 1800 calories. But to reduce she requires between 400 and 500 less, so about 1300 which should reduce her to the proper weight.

It is suggested that servings be reduced but no one item omitted. Strenuous reducing is always a matter for which you should see your doctor, as often health is seriously affected by unwise dieting.

Put a pound of scalded liver through the grinder, add 2 cups breadcrumbs, 1/2 cup grated onion, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper, four tablespoons bacon drippings and a pinch of majoram if desired. Mix and form into cakes about 1/2 inch thick. Roll in flour and fry in bacon fat. Serve with grilled bacon.
