

Yankees Start Poorly, Dizzy Dean Hurls Shutout in Opener

Gomez Beaten By Single Run

History Repeated; Cards Require Ten Innings To Win Over Reds

NEW YORK, April 20.—(AP)—The world's champion New York Yankees got off to an inauspicious start in their quest for another American league championship today, dropping the 1937 opener to the Washington Senators, 3 to 2, before a paid attendance of 45,850 in the stadium.

Lefty Gomez, star Yankee southpaw, essaying a comeback after two more or less than a year, was the victim of his third opening day setback in three years. He has lost all three decisions by one run.

Except for the third inning, when the Yanks showed traces of the power that enabled them to pace the field by 12 1/2 games last season, Morton Weaver, veteran righthander who went the route for the Senators, would have scored a shutout. In this frame, the Yankees bunched four of their ten hits to score both their runs.
