Roberts Farm to Get 4000 Turkey Poult This Week

ROBERTS, April 28.—The first of a consignment of 4000 turkey poult was received at the E. A. Roberts farm near here Monday. The first lot includes 226 baby turkeys and the remaining ones will be received within a week. They are being supplied by W. W. Rutherford of the Howell Prairie district from his prize flock of Narragansettes.

The plan is to keep them in the brooder house for about eight weeks and then to transfer them to the open range in the alfalfa fields.

The green alfalfa in connection with a supplementary feed of mixed grains including a large percentage of corn results in a fast growth and a superior quality of meat, growers say. The turkeys from the Roberts farm have topped the market during former years.

They will be in charge of Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Johnson, who are experienced in the care of turkeys. They will occupy a trailer cabin to care for the turkeys when they are put on range.

Federal Building Cornerstone Laid

Workmen on the new federal building Tuesday swung the cornerstone into place without pausing for ceremony. The great slab of granite at the northwest corner of the building bears the engraved names of Henry Morgenthau, secretary of the treasury; James A. Farley, postmaster-general; and Louis Simon, architect. With drier weather, and arrival last week of four cars of granite and shipments of window frames, work is expected to go forward without interruption until October when the west portion of the building should be completed.

Students Getting Office Experience

Commerce Seniors Receive Practical Work; Long Standing Custom

Seniors in the high school commerce department are being sent out to the business and professional men for experience in stenographic, bookkeeping, and salesmanship work.

A large number of the students are prepared for this work and are ready to be sent out where they will work one-half day morning or afternoon, during the remaining six weeks of school, as a part of their commercial course.

These students are thoroughly trained and will soon be ready for permanent position. Business and professional men, whether or not they intend employing a stenographer, accountant, salesman or office worker permanently, may secure one of these students as an assistant for any part of the next six weeks by calling Merritt Davis at the high school.

This work is offered for a two-fold purpose: To give the business men who may in the future want to select an employee from the department an opportunity to try out the young people and to give the students actual experience and confidence before accepting permanent employment. This plan has been followed for a number of years and has had the hearty cooperation and support of the local business men as a worthy and helpful project.

Merritt Davis, head of the commerce department, states that he has placed more commercial graduates during the year than in the three years previous.

Rehabilitation in Valley Advancing

Farm Aid Plan in 2 Years Helps 147 Families in Marion and Polk

Marion and Polk counties' rural rehabilitation program will complete its second year under the resettlement administration on April 30 with a total of 29 farm families in Marion county and 108 farm families in Polk county being serviced under the standard loan program and an additional 141 families in Polk and 499 families in Marion county assisted through the emergency grant program, according to T. R. Hobart, county supervisor.

Standard loans made to families without credit facilities for necessary feed, seed, livestock, farming equipment and capital goods necessary to place their farms on a productive basis, are assisting these farm families in regaining economic security. Practical farm and home plans insuring maximum use of all facilities of the farm are worked out with each loan.

Loans made in Polk county total \$24,622.00 and in Marion county \$69,303.17, or an average of about \$600, while emergency grants in Polk county total \$9,374.33 and in Marion county total \$35,019.73 to date. Collections of payments due on the three to five-year loans have been excellent with a total of \$2,809.79 already repaid in Polk county and \$9,383.15 in Marion county.

Applications for standard loans and grants are still being received at the county supervisor's office in addition to servicing families already under the program. Every effort is being made to extend assistance to all local as well as farm families from the drought area, able to qualify for loan or grant aid.
