

Philharmonic Group Sings At Church

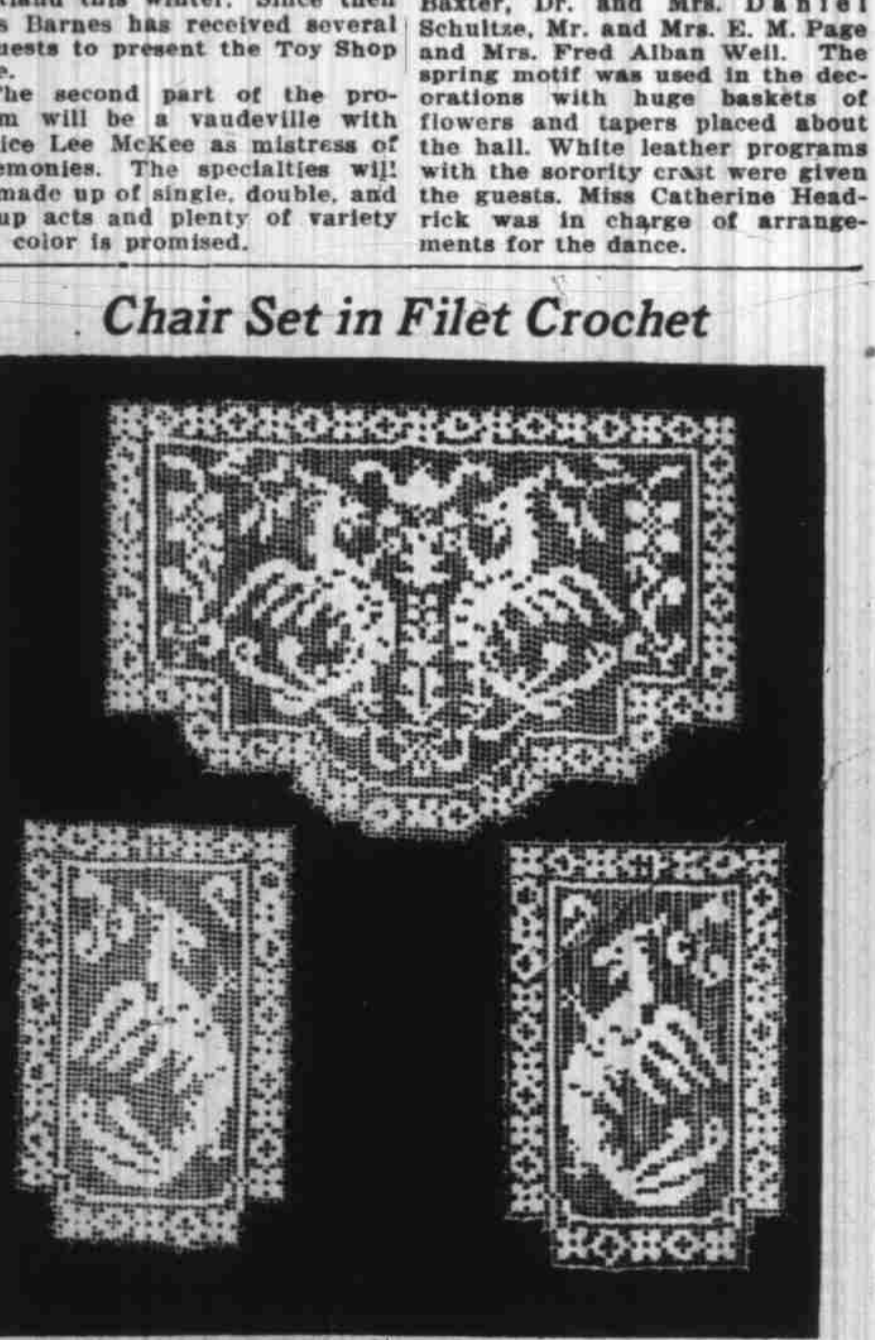
