Scotty McDougall, sandy-haired had man from the highlands, will represent force tonight in a battle between brute force and brains. The original Black Panther, clever negro grappler from Louisville, Kentucky, will represent brains.

The pair of muscle-kneaders, both of whom appeared on last week's card, are matched in the main event of the American Legion wrestling show which starts at the armory at 8:30 o'clock.

McDougall, as surely a Scotchman as ever rubbed a dime between his fingers, has lost twice in his two appearances here. He lost to Tommy Tassia on a foul in his first appearance and was downed by Otis Clingman last week.

The Black Panther, a coal-black gentleman from the south, demonstrated in his initial appearance last week that he is a master of the type of grappling which delighted Farmer Burns and Frank Gotch. He handled Tommy Tassia with ease, winning with one fall although it was apparent that he could have taken a second at almost any time.

Sailor Moran, the untamed meane from New Orleans, exponent of the solid right to the heart, will mix with the clever Irishman from West Salem, Mickey McGuire, in the 45 minute semi-windup. McGuire triumphed last week over Marshall Carter, Detroit grappler who is said to be one of the five best middleweights in the world.

Noel Franklin, hated Portland menace, will meet Tommy Tassia in the 30 minute opener.

Bill Anton, whose only previous start was against Albany College, gave up only seven hits to the Wolves but errors in crucial spots deprived him of a win. O'Connell's home run with one aboard in the ninth was the winner for the Wolves after they had scored twice in the eighth to tie the count at eight all.

The eighth was a big inning for the Bearcats, who batted around to score six runs and take over the lead briefly.

The Bearcats, with 10 hits, outlasted the Wolves, who used three pitchers. Orren with three hits and Aden and Williamson with two each led Bearcat hitting. Coach "Spec" Keene said that Anton, the erstwhile basketball center, pitched as good a game as any Willamette pitcher has turned in this season. Johnson scored with the tying run and Newsome, who had gone to third on the misplay, clattered across the plate a moment later with the winning marker on Chalmers Criswell's two-bagger.

WHEN Adrian Quist lost to Ricardo Tapia in the Australians' first-round matches against Mexico, the spotlight was focused more strongly than ever upon Vivian McGrath.

McGrath holds the Australian national title at present, and despite an abscessed finger, was easily the best looking of the Aussies against Mexico. He won his first match of the series handily, only to be forced

to the sidelines with an infected throat before his second singles duty.

If McGrath—the Aussies pronounce it "McGraw"—can round into shape in time for the North American finals, he may be the most dependable singles performer for the team from Down Under. His famed two-handed backhand is functioning better than ever, and he rates an edge over any U. S. player with the exception of Don Budge.

Even if McGrath isn't able to play, Australia will still be formidable, with Crawford, Quist and Brownich to choose from as singles contestants.

Quist probably had an off day in his losing battle with Tapia, for he is rated high on the world ranking list. Crawford, a smart veteran beat Budge last year at German town.
