

Windsor Plans Spirited Fight

Marriage Contract Made Under British Law to Protect Succession

Rogers disclosed that Edward, with a marriage contract signed and almost all details of the wedding ceremony cleared up, is planning a secret honeymoon of three weeks "somewhere" where the eyes of the world will not be upon them.

Marriage Will Be in Accord With Canons

Despite the duke's disagreements with the Archbishop of Canterbury during the abdication crisis, Rogers declared, the marriage "would of course be in accordance with Anglican church" canons.

He said a marriage contract signed under English law between the duke and Mrs. Warfield was designed to "prevent any future conflict between French and English law."

"This means that if they have children, the succession will operate under English law," he said.

Edward renounced all rights of succession to the British throne for himself and his descendants at the time of his abdication, and a newly-created title of Duke of Windsor would be handed down to his eldest son.

The possibility arose that Mrs. Warfield, when she is pronounced H. R. H. the Duchess of Windsor, will receive minute instructions from the mayor of Monts, who will officiate, on how to rear and care for babies.

The usual civil ceremony, in which the bride promises to obey her husband, will follow.

LONDON, May 19.—Word from Monts that Mrs. Wallis Warfield would become "her royal highness" on her marriage June 3 to Britain's ex-king was received here tonight with mixed foreboding and bewilderment in social circles.

The peer commented cryptically: "Personally, I'm in favor of her—but it is going to cause a social revolution around here if they ever return to London to live."

A typical comment was: "It would have been better all around if she were content merely to be called 'your highness' and let it go at that."

Another reaction heard was: "It's going to be slightly awkward if and when they ever return to England. I would like to present the first time the Duchess of Norfolk (wife of the premier duke and earl) is required to call her 'your royal highness'."

Two Plead Guilty To Liquor Charge

Frank J. Tschauner and Walter McGarvie, two of four men arrested Tuesday night by federal agents for selling intoxicants to Indians received hearing in Woodburn and Salem justice courts yesterday while the two others, Fred W. Cooper and Frank Johnson, will be arraigned before the federal grand jury in Portland.

Tschauner, who was charged specifically with selling wine to an Indian, pleaded guilty in Judge Overton's court at Woodburn yesterday afternoon and was fined \$500 and costs and given a four months jail sentence. The jail sentence was suspended.

McGarvie appeared before City Recorder A. Warren Jones, acting for Justice of the Peace Miller B. Hayden, and pleaded guilty to selling beer to an Indian. He posted a \$1000 bond and the case was continued for sentence.

The charges against Cooper and Johnson, who allegedly sold whiskey to Indians, are more serious and they will face federal authorities.

James Simonton Called by Death

INDEPENDENCE, May 19.—James R. Simonton, 62, a well known resident of Independence and who had lived in Polk county for more than 40 years, passed away at his home, 190 Sixth street, Tuesday at 4:30 a. m., following a brief illness. Mr. Simonton had apparently been in good health until he suffered a paralytic stroke Monday night.

The son of James and Malinda Koser Simonton, he was born in Pennsylvania July 16, 1874. He came to Oregon with his parents at the age of 3 years, the family locating at Dallas and later at Rickreall. He was married to Miss Viola Alexander, a member of one of Polk county's prominent pioneer families, who survives.

Boy, 3, Absolved Of Slaying Baby

NEW YORK, May 19.—(AP)—Noel Galvin went tonight about the normal, happy concerns of a three-year-old boy, all unknowing that between dawn and dusk there had been lifted a tragic something that might have shadowed all his life.

This morning Noel was publicly called by the authorities a little boy who had killed his baby sister, three-months-old Dolores.

With the amiability of a child, Noel had told a police detective he had repeatedly hit his sister. "With this?" asked the detective, showing a toy airplane.

"Yes," the boy had said over and over again as more toys were shown and the same question was put to him.

The investigating officers then thought that Noel had struck Dolores because he was jealous. They planned no action against him, of course, because it was explained a lad under seven cannot, under the law in this state, possibly be deemed guilty of a crime.

But the story he might have heard in the future will never be told because this afternoon Medical Examiner George W. Ruser said Dolores had "died of an enlarged thyroid gland—nothing else and that Noel could not have had anything to do with her death."

Peace Meeting in Portland Delayed

PORTLAND, Ore., May 19.—(AP)—Clarence Young, counsel for Montgomery & Ward Co., said today the national labor relations board had granted the company a 10-day extension of an order to reinstate 51 discharged workers at its Portland branch.

The firm asked for the delay to permit filing of exceptions to an intermediate board report of Dr. Towne Nylander, who presided at a hearing on charges of Wagner act violations filed by the discharged employees against the company. The order was to have been effective today.

A peace meeting in the jurisdictional dispute between the International Longshoremen's association and the teamsters' union at the Meier & Frank department store warehouse failed to materialize today when representatives of all affected unions could not be located. The meeting was deferred until tomorrow.
