

### Jurisdictional Row Is Bitter

The agreement owes little or nothing to the action of the chair."  
In the warehouse jurisdictional dispute, following the receipt of Green's wire Wednesday, Gust Anderson, secretary of the Central Labor council, notified the local warehousemen's branch of the International Longshoremen's association that the council would follow the ouster instructions if local warehousemen failed to abide by Green's decision.

Members of the L. L. A. are now on strike at the Meier and Frank department store warehouse where the teamsters claim jurisdiction. The L. L. A. was understood to have reiterated that it would "trade no members with teamsters" union in spite of Green's wire.

SEATTLE, May 20.—(P)—The Pacific coast conference of the International Longshoremen's association today endorsed an action of the warehousemen, and called on the workers union, an L. L. A. affiliate, in maintaining a mass picket line at the plant of the Bemis Bag Co. here.

The picket line endorsement was the only official cognizance the convention took of last night's unopposed action of L. L. A. warehousemen's delegates to the Seattle central labor council.

William Green, American Federation of Labor president, ordered the ouster after the L. L. A. group refused to recognize the jurisdiction of the teamsters' union over inland warehousemen.

Other action at the L. L. A. convention, which is expected to adjourn tomorrow, included a demand for an "accounting" from Joseph P. Ryan, international president of the Longshoremen's association.

Spokesmen accused Ryan of stopping salaries of three coast officials—one of them President Harry Bridges, Ryan, in a telegram, said Bridges sought to disrupt the form of L. L. A. organization in the Atlantic and Gulf coast districts.

### Wild Flowers in Home Garden Plot

SENA, May 20.—Wild flowers are a pleasant hobby with some of the young folk of this community. Two years ago Alice Crawford began with a few of the better known varieties and now has a nice collection. Among them is a trillium which had only one bloom stalk when she brought it from the woods. Now it boasts seven and the largest blossom measures five and a half inches from tip to tip. A wild tiger lily which has had no attention at all except for the planting is exceptionally pretty. Last year it measured 72 inches in height and had 19 blossoms. This year it is already 60 inches tall and the buds are beginning to form.

The plant grows rapidly, gaining an inch a day since it was measured May 15.

This force routed seven battalions of Basque mountaineers, reinforced by a brigade of Asturias, yesterday with hand grenades and bayonet charges.

BRUSSELS, May 20.—(P)—An authority close to French Foreign Minister Yvon Delbos said tonight that France has approved a British proposal looking toward a suspension of hostilities in Spain to permit the withdrawal of foreign volunteers.

ST. NAZAIRE, France, May 20.—(P)—Officials of the French line said tonight that 500 Spanish refugee children will be carried to Mexico by the French liner Mexique, which will call at Bordeaux May 24 to embark them for Vera Cruz.

ROME, May 20.—(P)—The Italian flag has appeared in the insurgent advance on Bilbao, besieged Basque capital, a dispatch by Italian correspondent Marco Franzetti from Salamanca, Spain, to La Tribuna, said today.

The dispatch said the Italian flag was flown from motor cars.

### CCC Permanent Favored, Senate

WASHINGTON, May 20.—(P)—Economy advocates failed to persuade the senate today to join a house revolt against President Roosevelt's request that the Civilian Conservation Corps be made permanent.

The senate approved the administration's bill to make the CCC a permanent federal enterprise, with only Senators King (D-Utah) and Borah (R-Ida) opposed on the final vote.

King declared he would approve a two-year extension but could not vote for a permanent set-up because "we don't know what changes may be made in its administration."

"We don't know whether it will tend to develop into militarism, socialism or what," he said. The bill now goes to a conference with the house, which has voted to limit extension to two years.
