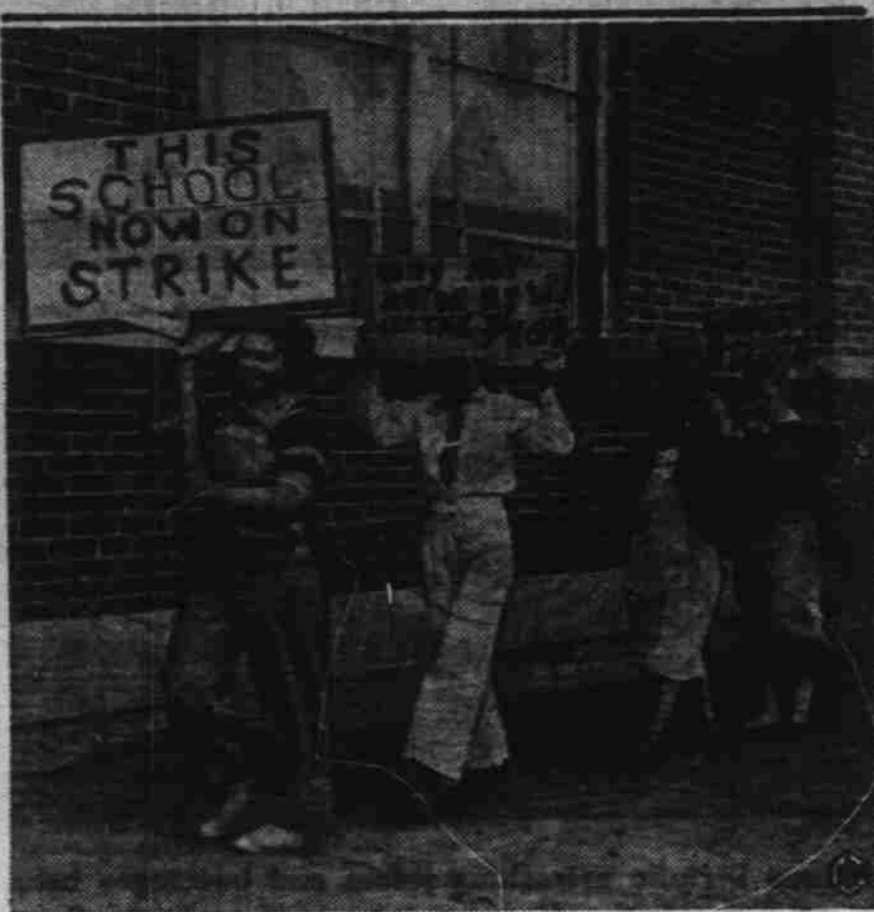


Hire 6 new Instructors
