Appeal Begun In Milk Case

Agriculture Department's Ruling Against Peters Taken Into Court

Appeal from an order of the department of agriculture revoking the milk and cream test license of O. H. Peters was filed in circuit court yesterday. Clerks reported that this was the first appeal from a department order that has been filed in Marion county.

The appeal sets out that Peters is in charge of the Oregon City Creamery station at 625 North Capitol street and that the order revoking the license was filed April 30 of this year.

In the case of W. E. Savage and Bruce Fox against the milk control board by which the validity of the control act is attacked a stipulation was filed in circuit court by the parties permitting the plaintiffs to file an amended complaint setting up a new objection to the law in that the law is an illegal delegation of legislative power and thus a violation of the constitution.
