Then came Chamberlain. Quickly the new leader formed his cabinet.

It was still a coalition government, 21 members with 15 conservatives, four liberal nationalists and two national laborites.

Sir John Simon, formerly home secretary, stepped into Chamberlain's chancellor post.

Sir Samuel Hoare, first lord of the admiralty, became home secretary. Alfred Duff Cooper, Baldwin's secretary of war, was appointed to the admiralty.

Leslie Hore-Belisha, former minister of transport, was made secretary of war. Oliver Stanley became president of the board of trade, succeeding Walter Runciman who was elevated to the peerage.

Fingerprinting of Civilians Planned

20-30 Club to Establish Booth; Benefits to Citizens Cited

A program of fingerprinting all Salem people who volunteer to have their prints recorded was launched Friday night by the Salem Twenty-Three club at its regular meeting following a talk by Captain Walter Lansing of the state police in which the advantages of such a program were pointed out.

He declared recording of fingerprints was more helpful to civilians than to the department of justice, in such cases as the New London school disaster where fingerprints would have helped to identify victims; identification of amnesia victims; protection of innocent persons arrested on suspicion as in the case of innumerable Mattson kidnappers, and similar situations.

The public has shied away from fingerprinting prejudice due to its use in criminal detection, but the prints of civilians are kept separate from those of criminals, Captain Lansing said.

Estimate Is 168 Deaths in Flood

EL ORO, Mexico, May 28 —(P)—Pedro Juarez, mayor of avalanche-stricken Tlalpujahua, tonight estimated 168 inhabitants died in the sudden rush of mud and sand that engulfed parts of the mining town, 15 miles from here in Michoacan state.

Rescue workers digging in the mud had already uncovered 52 bodies, and the mayor stated a check of survivors indicated 115 others were still buried in the mass of debris.

Hundreds of rescue workers were digging through the mud that in some places below the town reached a depth of 50 or 60 feet.

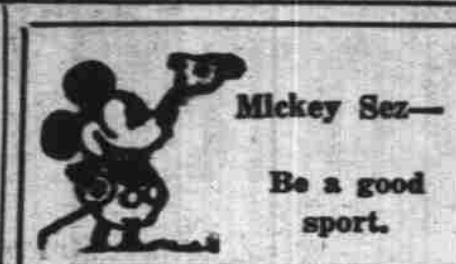

Hello, Fellow Collectors:
Do you remember the stamps in the newsreel last Saturday. The stamp pictured George VI, is light brown and is 1/4d. or 3 cents. It was put on sale May 10 and will probably be in use for some time.

Perhaps you have been in doubt about what a pre-cancel is. Probably you have noticed stamps with the name of some city and state overprinted in black on it. That is a pre-cancel stamp.

Large companies which send out lots of mail take out a pre-cancel license from the postoffice. This allows them to buy sheets of stamps surcharged with the name of their city and state. When these stamps go through the mail they aren't cancelled at the postoffice. No one without a license can buy pre-cancels. If you collect them as part of your hobby, you will discover that there are a good many different types of pre-cancels.

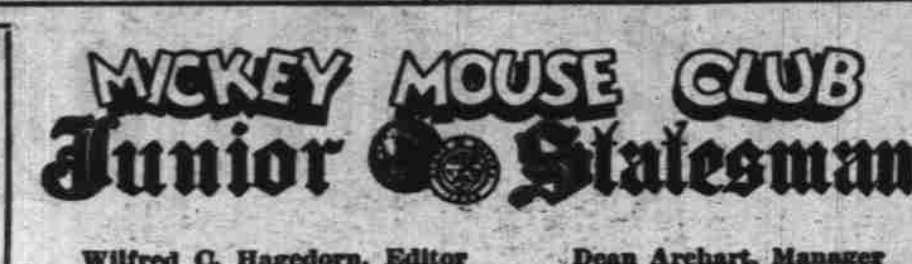
