

Man Here Is Held On Murder Charge

William Meyers Wanted in Pennsylvania for 16-Year Old Crime

Extradition of William Meyers, 35 year old Salem resident, to Pennsylvania to face a 16 year old indictment charging him with murder will be sought, Pennsylvania state police notified the Salem police department yesterday.

Meyers, who was arrested by Salem police Sunday on information from Pennsylvania, is charged with the murder of one Mark Brown in a double slaying in Potter county, Pennsylvania, in which an Archie Carling was also killed. The crime occurred in August, 1921.

While Meyers denies that he ever lived in Pennsylvania and states that he was working in Oakland, Calif., at the time he was supposed to have committed the crime fingerprints and other data sent from Pennsylvania check closely, police revealed.

Pennsylvania authorities informed the Salem police yesterday that a man is leaving from there immediately to pick up Meyers after extradition is arranged.

Meyers was arrested on a Salem street but has lived for several months with his wife and three children at 355 Bellevue. The family has been in Salem for several months and once sought relief from the Red Cross.

Mrs. Meyers, who married Meyers in 1929 in Washington, said that she would try to prove an alibi for her husband. Meyers states that he was employed by a contracting firm in Oakland, Calif., at the time of the crime.

Mrs. Meyers, who says her father is a Spokane attorney, claims that she was a newspaper woman in the employ of the Spokesman-Review at Spokane several years ago and later was a feature writer for the Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

Atlantic Flights To Start June 24

ST. JOHNS, Newfoundland, May 31.—(Canadian Press)—Trans-Atlantic flights will be started June 24 by way of Newfoundland by Imperial and Pan American Airways planes, Imperial officials announced today.

It was believed an Imperial plane would fly from England and a Pan American plane from New York.

The experiments would be similar to tests made last week by Imperial and Pan American planes between the United States and Bermuda.

On the trans-Atlantic flights the planes presumably would take off from England and New York at approximately the same time.

Botwood, the base from which the British fliers Alcock and Brown began their successful trans-Atlantic flight 18 years ago, was to be a temporary landing field. Botwood is about 20 miles from Grand Falls and 200 miles by rail from St. Johns. Later it was expected Gander Lake, with the Newfoundland airport alongside, would be used as permanent base for the ocean craft.

Germans Avenge Bombing of Ship

bombardment of the Deutschland by two Spanish government warplanes, revenge attack by Germany, and withdrawal of Italy and Germany from the neutrality committee—roused grave expressions of fear for peace.

Regard Incident Closed
There were indications that Germany now regarded the Deutschland incident satisfactorily closed, that she would take no further retaliation.

But, sources said here, there was still the danger that an outraged Spanish government would take action and might even declare war against Germany. (The Spanish regime at Valencia repeatedly has contended that Germany and Italy were warring against Spain by supporting insurgent Generalissimo Franco.) French and British diplomats worked to prevent open outbreak of hostilities.

British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden appealed to Germany to take no new action which would "render the present grave situation more serious."

French and British naval officials exchanged views and presumably discussed what steps might be taken in the event of further developments.

Both nations put their naval forces within the danger zone. French warships steamed through the Mediterranean toward Almeria. The British admiralty ordered its naval commanders to use a free hand and act in any situation at their discretion.

British foreign office spokesmen made no effort to conceal gravity of the break between Spain and Germany.

Asks for Guarantee
Germany's communique to the non-intervention committee said she would return to the patrol only when sufficient guarantee was provided against another Deutschland incident (the Deutschland was on patrol duty for the committee, but "resting" in the insurgent Ibiza harbor when attacked by Spanish government planes).

In the meantime, the German announcement said, the reich "will decide according to its own ideas on measures to be taken toward the red rulers..." (the Valencia-Madrid government.)

The German fleet was ordered to Spanish waters to aid fighting ships already there, under orders to shoot at sight any approaching and menacing Spanish government warship or airplane.

Wedding Flowers Arrive at Chateau

MONTS, France, May 31.—(AP)—The picturesque Chateau de Candé received today a \$1300 consignment of flowers which will form a background for the wedding of Windsor and Mrs. Wallis Warfield.

Mrs. Warfield, assisted by a London decorator, planned the flower motif for the chateau music room where the wedding will take place. The decorator, who often arranges the flowers at Fort Belvedere, the duke's retreat when he was king, arrived today and will remain in Tours until after the wedding.

At the same time, a smiling truck driver drove up to one of the chateau gates announcing he had a cargo of flowers from Paris. Mrs. Charles E. Bedaux, wife of the chateau's owner, was understood to have selected the \$1300 consignment.

The long-awaited wedding ring, fashioned of Welsh gold by a Rue de la Paix jeweler, arrived during the day, preceding the first wedding guests by 24 hours.

Mayor Charles Mercier, who will perform the ceremony, finished work on a speech he will deliver to Edward and his bride. He disclosed that plans for a double ring wedding have been cancelled and the single ring ritual will be used.

In the kitchen, Jean Didot, the chef, directed the staff in preparations for the wedding breakfast.

Crater Lake "Strays" Over California Line
PORTLAND, May 31.—(AP)—The chamber of commerce "saw red" today when they learned Crater Lake had moved into California. A double-page advertisement in a national news magazine showed tractors working at "Crater Lake, California."

The chamber protested to the tractor company's eastern advertising agency, Manager Walter W. R. May of the chamber asserting that it emphasizes the need of telling the nation where Oregon's attractions are.

Show 65 Jerseys At Spring Jubilee

Rex Ross Gets First on Bulls, O. E. Beaty First on Cows

Rex Ross of Mt. Angel carried off junior, senior and grand champion honors in bulls but dropped grand champion cow to O. E. Beaty of Chemawa when Beaty's junior champion placed over Ross' senior champion at the annual Marion county Jersey Cattle Club spring jubilee held at the fairgrounds yesterday.

Sixty-five Jerseys were entered in the show, one of the liveliest held in the county in some years, and which drew a number of new breeders. Dr. I. R. Jones of the dairy department at Oregon State college judged the entries.

T. R. Warren of Portland, western fieldman of the American Jersey Cattle club, attended and gave high praise to the Marion county show, which opens a series of seven in western Oregon within the next eight days.

Warren pointed out that the grand champion bull bred by Ross of Mt. Angel and from a line bred in this county for years, won over the senior champion, which Ross recently imported from the Isle of Jersey. He also recalled that the Jersey jubilee idea, now nationwide, started in Oregon 20 years ago to honor the world's record senior 4-year-old, Vive La France, of the Pickard Bros. herd at Marion. The first jubilee was a day and a half tour starting in Portland and ending at the Pickard farm. The late Congressman C. N. McArthur was a leader in the original jubilee.

About 15 years ago, the single state tour gave way, on suggestion of E. A. Rhoten of Salem, to the several spring shows.

First place in the adult classes judged yesterday follow:
Bulls—Junior calf, senior yearling and aged, Rex Ross; senior calf, O. E. Beaty; two-year-old, J. R. Davis, Salem; three-year-old, Alice M. Davis, Salem. The aged bull of Ross and which was also senior champion was the recent importation, Imported Samaras Diana's Peer.

Cows—Junior heifer calf, three-year-old, and four-year-old, Rex Ross; senior heifer calf, and two-year-old, D. C. Brock, Salem; junior yearling, M. G. Gunderson, Silverton; senior yearling, Beaty; aged cow, Alice M. Davis.

Groups—Get of sire, Beaty; produce, Ross; three cows in milk, Brock.

Five boys from the boys training school at Woodburn helped show the training school herd, and took first, second and third in junior showmanship and also made placings in practice judging for all juniors, including Future Farmers and 4-H club members.

Calvin Mikkleson, Future Farmer from Silverton, was the only junior to place his class perfectly in showmanship.

Best calf under one year—Arnold Jensen, Cloverdale, member calf club directed by Otto Pfennig.

Best calf over one year—Alice Roberts, Turner.

OREGON CITY, May 31.—(AP)—The body of Sanders Charles Thompson, 45, service station and beer parlor operator at Brightwood on the Mount Hood Loop highway, was found late today at the site of a power house he was building.

He fell nine feet from a 16-foot waterwheel, his head in a creek and his body wedged between the wheel and the foundation.

Thompson was single, and came to Brightwood from Seaside five months ago.

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Bury Ex-Alaskan, Was Married Here

TILLAMOOK, Ore., May 31.—(AP)—Mike F. McLeod, 47, who used to travel over Alaskan snowfields by dog sled on errands of mercy, was buried last week in the Knights of Pythias cemetery at Nehalem.

Death of the Mohler resort owner, a native of Kodiak, Alaska, came three weeks after a major operation.

McLeod served with the federal bureau of education at Kodiak for 11 years. His education was completed at Salem, Oregon, where he married Alberta E. Brigham.

Mrs. McLeod accompanied her husband on his return to the north, and the two worked together at the government hospital at Tenana, established a school at Karluk, taught natives at Kodiak and established a clinic there.

In connection with his hospital work, McLeod covered a radius of 40 miles by dog sled to bring in sufferers, and visited remote bays and beaches in a small boat which was often iced down.

In 1935 his health failed, and he came to Mohler with Mrs. McLeod, establishing a fishing resort.

Survivors include the widow, three children, and a brother and two sisters of Seattle.

Alliance Head Speaks in Salem

David Lasser, president of Workers' alliance, spoke in Salem in the labor temple Saturday night before an audience composed of WPA members from various parts of the county. He declared the purpose of his organization to preserve the gains made for the unemployed to live decently and to add to those gains by winning social security.

Lasser asserted it is the duty of democratic government to provide work for people who are unable to find it in private industry and to establish standards sufficient to meet increased costs of living.

Merchants, he said, would suffer in decreased buying power of their customers if men are thrown off relief the first of July as is feared.

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
