150 Mt. Angel Alumni Gather

Archbishop Howard Talks; Cable Will Be Sent to Holy Father

MT. ANGEL, May 31.—One hundred fifty alumni of Mt. Angel college gathered at Mt. Angel this morning to take part in the golden jubilee celebration. Senator Francis Franciscovich, active governor of Oregon and an alumnus of Mt. Angel college, represented Governor Martin.

Archbishop Edward D. Howard of Portland officiated at the pontifical high mass in St. Mary's church which opened the celebration at 10:00 a. m. Led by the Mt. Angel band the assembly of alumni and clergy marched in procession from the school to the church.

Assisting the archbishop at the mass were Rev. Vincent Kappert, O. S. B., rector of Mt. Angel college, as arch priest; Rev. Valentine Mollenbeier of Portland as deacon; Rev. Joseph Heesacker of Woodburn as subdeacon; Rev. Alcuin Heibel, O. S. B., of Mt. Angel and Rev. Louis Sanders of Portland as lectors of honor; and Rev. Robert Koerber, O. S. B., and Rev. Thomas Brockhaus, O. S. B., both of the abbey at Mt. Angel, as masters of ceremonies. All assistants were alumni.

Also in the sanctuary were Rt. Rev. Abbot Thomas Meier, O. S. B., of Mt. Angel, Rev. Francis R. Leibel of Eugene, and Rt. Rev. Abbot Cuthbert Geob, of the assumption abbey, Richardson, N. D.

Leipzig Reviews Work
Rev. Francis P. Leipzig gave the occasional sermon in which he reviewed the 50 years of glorious service to education completed by the benedictines of Mt. Angel. He called that first little college of 50 years ago the nursery of Christian education in the old Oregon country.

He paid tribute to the founder, Father Oedermt, and that zealous group that made up the first teaching staff. These men, he said, little realized the far-reaching effects of their efforts and that it would be an alumnus of their college, Hon. John P. Kavanaugh, whose convincing arguments in the supreme court would win for all time the right to a Christian education to the peoples of the United States; that one of their boys, Crutcher Kearen, would head the national Catholic radio broadcast; that another alumnus, Rev. Louis Sanders, would influence thousands by his writings in the Sunday Visitor; that today there would be 23 secular priests in the Portland diocese alone that can call Mt. Angel college and seminary their alma mater; and that one of the boys of M. A. C., Francis Franciscovich, would be active governor of the state of Oregon.

After the mass the annual alumni banquet was held in the dining hall of St. Mary's school. Rev. Valentine Mollenbeier acted as toastmaster. Members of the Mt. Angel college orchestra gave a number of musical selections.

Congratulated by Archbishop
Archbishop Howard congratulated the college on the splendid record and complimented the alumni on the wonderful examples given to the world. Thomas E. Shea of the class of 1919 and editor of the News-Telegram, stressed the fact that in all the changes of history and time, Christian education is the one thing that has stood firm and unchangeable. Umberto T. De Martini, '08, Portland attorney, talked on the importance of going back to the first principles in education. Rev. Alcuin Heibel, pastor of St. Morris church, Mt. Angel, paid tribute to the former rectors of Mt. Angel college.

Rev. Francis Leipzig of Eugene, Rev. Gregory Robl of Portland, Cuthbert Geob of Richardson, N. D., all great speakers, gave short congratulatory talks.

Kavanaugh Speaks
Hon. John P. Kavanaugh, '89, the first to receive a master's degree at M. A. C., chose reminiscences of his pleasant associations at the school as his subject. Rt. Vincent Koppert, rector of Mt. Angel college, talked on the need of the college to adjust education to the changing trends of the modern world. Acting Governor Franciscovich, '18, used the position of Christian education as a defender of the principles of government as the topic of his speech.

Farm Debts Cut By Federal Plan

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(AP)—The resettlement administration's debt adjustment program reduced indebtedness of 55,576 farmers by \$46,352,521, or 35.9 per cent, during the past 20 months, the RA said here today.

As a result, nearly \$3,300,000 in back taxes were paid local governments.

The total debt figure was reduced from \$182,827,530 to \$136,475,000 through outright reduction, extension of time, interest rate reduction or a combination of methods.

An analysis revealed that 39,360 new loans were made in aiding the debt adjustment, by federal and private agencies.

Hosch in Attack On Martin Plans

EUGENE, May 31.—(AP)—Attacking the views of Governor Charles Martin, J. P. Hosch of Benton voiced vehement advocacy of the proposed "postage stamp" rate for Bonneville power at an organization meeting of the Eugene local of the commonwealth federation.

Hosch, chairman of the utilities committee of the state house of representatives for the past three sessions, opposed permitting private utility companies to purchase power from the project, asserting that "they would dilute the entire project with their corruption."

S. Stephenson Smith, president of the state federation, said the organization proposed to "gain a large enough aggregate representation in state and national legislative bodies to exert influence on major utility issues."

Dr. William Wallace Youngson, Tillamook pastor, and Ben Hur Lampan, Portland writer, participated in the simple dedication program.

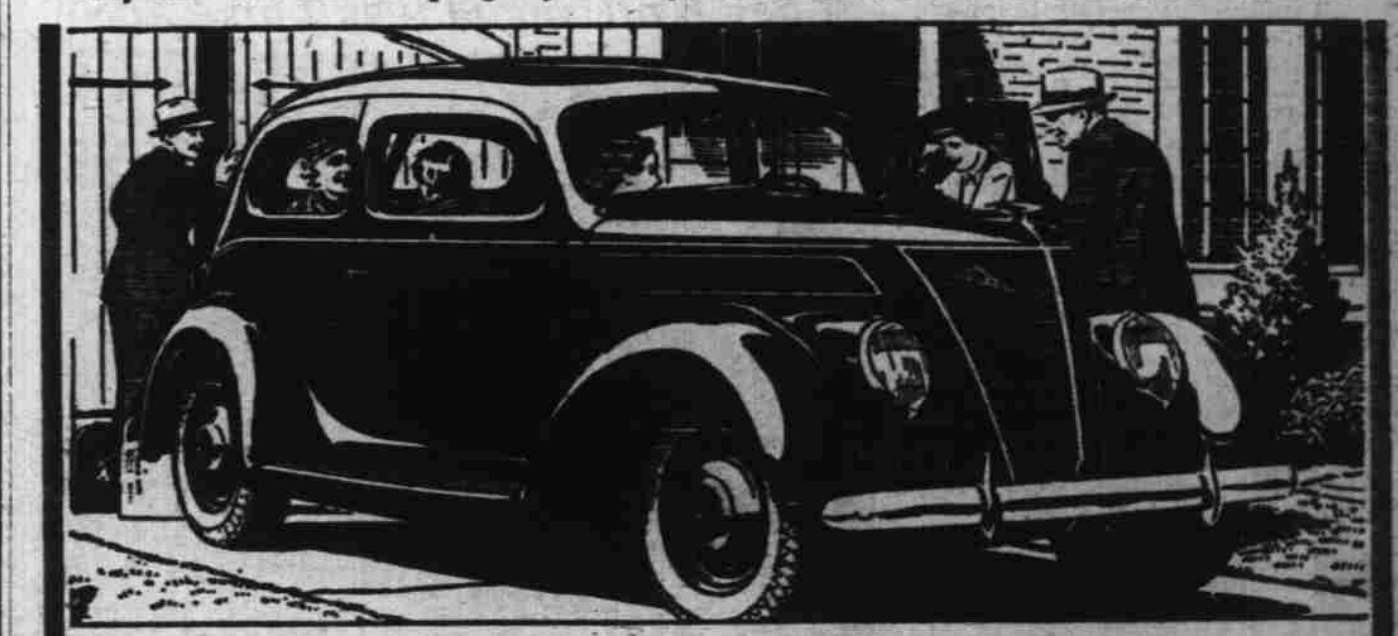
