Breaks Record For Speedway

Shaw Leads R. Hepburn by two Seconds to Win \$40,000 Prize

By CHARLES DUNKLEY INDIANAPOLIS, May 31-(AP)-Victory finally caught up with dapper Wilbur Shaw of Indianapolis today after seven attempts to win the Indianapolis 500-mile race, America's classic of the speedways.

In a record-breaking performance, Shaw roared to triumph, finishing by the close margin of two seconds ahead of the veteran Ralph Hepburn of Los Angeles. Their thrilling duel kept a recordbreaking crowd of 170,000 spectators roaring in tense excitement in the dramatic closing miles of

Hepburn, overcome by heat midway in the race, climbed back midway in the race, climbed back in his car to drive the remaining Brooklyn Game 87 miles and fought it out with Shaw every inch of the way. Only fourteen seconds separated them when they started their last two laps and he continued his desper-

ate challenge until the finish. Shaw covered the 500 miles faster than any driver ever whirled around this two and a half mile brick course before. His time was 4:24:07.81 to average 113.580 miles an hour, esclipsing the previous record of 109.069 miles an hour established by Louis Meyer of Huntington Park, Calif.,

Shaw, rated as a cagey driver, drove a masterful race and went the entire distance without relief. He stopped only twice to replenish fuel and change tires and was never worse than third. After losing the lead to Hepburn three times, Shaw regained it at 409 miles and hung on to the finish, breaking records as he tore over the bricks.

Shaw's car was one of his own creation. He designed it, built it and owns it.


