

Rossman Urges Extra Efforts

Speaks at Silverton High Graduation; Goetz Gives Advice

SILVERTON, June 5.—A little more effort and a little more knowledge than the man next you has, will give success, said George Rossman, associate justice Oregon supreme court, in his address to the 81 graduates of the Silverton high school Thursday night.

Too frequently, he declared, young men and women lacked the little extra persistence, the little extra patience, the little extra knowledge or the little extra hard work which make the difference between success and failure.

The world, he continued, is worrying about the boy and girl who come out of school at this time because there seems such a lack of employment, but prosperity and social position "have never been stepping stones to success. Effort and knowledge are the stones needed."

The speaker admitted that those coming out into the world at this time, because they would have so much more leisure, would also need more character than those of a few years ago. Success for these, he said, will depend much upon how they employ their spare time.

Urges Constructive View
"You should raise your right hand and pledge," Judge Rossman said in conclusion, "that you will not leave America weaker than you have found it but stronger and better."

Robert Goetz, superintendent of schools, in his farewell address to the seniors, expressed the hope that the faculty had given them a better attitude toward society and an ability to think things out for themselves. Truth, he said, was the thing for which to search.

Receiving special honors were Esther Lockren, valedictorian; Helen Goodknecht, salutatorian; Margery Hillman, T.N.T. selection for being the most representative girl students in scholarship and student activity; Lyle Specht, for being the most outstanding boy student. Robert White was announced as the high school student showing the most progress during the past year. White is a junior.

Robert Goetz presented the diplomas and Herman Kramer the honors.

Urges Justice and Morality as Foundations for Happiest Life

"Happiness," he said "is the master impulse of life" and he advised the young women to remember that happiness can only be attained by a life built on justice and morality. He stated that the unhappy economic conditions today are but the result of everyone thinking only of their rights and forgetting about their duties.

Owing to stress of farm and orchard work no Farmers Union meeting was held Wednesday night and there will be no more meetings through the summer.

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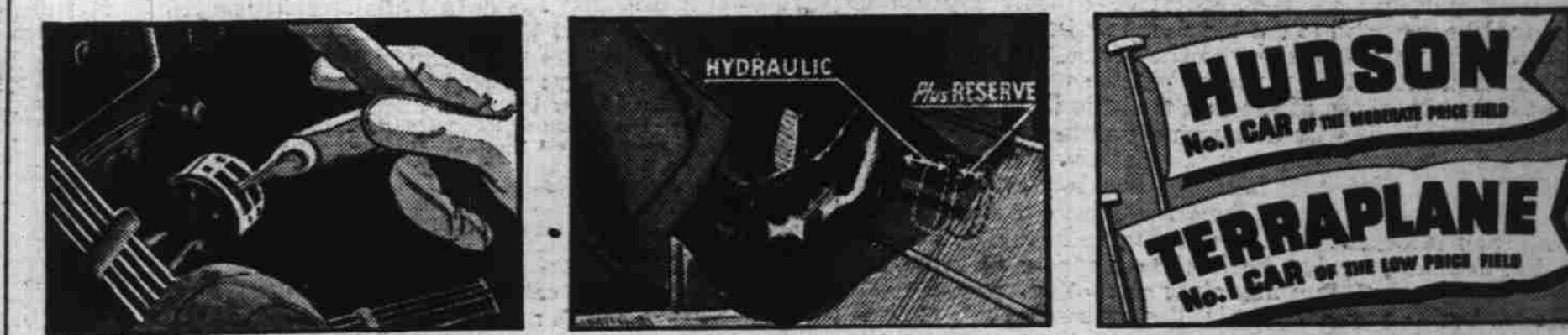
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Silverton Schools Report End Year
