Elsinore Will Show Ski Film

"Slalom" Combines Shots of Winter Sports and Pleasing Romance

Ski enthusiasts, that rapidly increasing group in Salem as well as throughout the nation, will be enthralled by the showing here of "Slalom," the amazing feature-length Swiss ski romance which will be shown today, Monday and Tuesday at the Elsinore theatre on a double bill.

Filmed on the picturesque Alpine slopes of St. Moritz, Switzerland, the picture has been hailed by winter sports and ski devotees in all parts of America.

Reviewers have declared that "Slalom" presents superb scenic shots of snow-clad Switzerland and is replete with exceptional performances of skiing in all its forms as well as fancy skating and ski-joring.

John Beal Stars In Capitol Film

"Man Who Found Himself" Has "Different" Plot and Capable Cast

The prime recommendation which the reviewer can confer on "The Man Who Found Himself," the latest offering of the Capitol theatre, is that it is well off the beaten path trod by Hollywood films.

Marked by brilliant performances by its principals and by a thoroughly human and appealing story of a man's regeneration, "The Man Who Found Himself" weaves novel into its theme: eulogizing aviation's newest development, the ambulance plane, as an important instrument in its plot.

The story revolves about a rising aviator who, after a crash in a tragic mishap and disgrace, the young physician abruptly abandons his career and, under an assumed name, goes to California. Securing a job as pilot of an ambulance plane used to expedite medical aid to rural districts, he becomes interested in the nurse attached to the plane. Learning his identity, she starts a one-girl campaign to make him a useful citizen again. How this campaign works out forms the basis of the latter half of the film, which offers plenty of drama and action to picture patrons.

As the discouraged young doctor, John Beal gives one of the best performances of his career, and he makes this character believable and sympathetic. Joan Fontaine, a lovely addition to screen ranks, makes her debut as a leading lady in the role of the resolute nurse, Philip Huston, Jane Walsh, George Irving and Frank M. 'Lost Horizon' At Grand Soon

Ronald Colman Starred in Film of Strange Land; Starts Wednesday

What promises to be one of the most important screen events of the year takes place Wednesday at the Grand theatre, where Frank Capra's supreme directorial effort, "Lost Horizon," makes its bow. Starring Ronald Colman, and featuring Edward Everett Horton, H. B. Warner, Jane Wyatt, Margo, John Howard, Thomas Mitchell, Isabel Jewell, Sam Jaffe in the much discussed High Lama role, the picture is an adaptation by Robert Riskin of James Hilton's celebrated novel of the same name.

The eyes of Hollywood and, indeed, alert movie fans of the country over, have been on "Lost Horizon" since Capra began preparations on it at the Columbia studios more than two years ago. There seems to have been two good reasons for this. First, because it is most elaborate production ever launched by Columbia or directed by Capra; second, because many were of opinion that the job of transferring Hilton's sensational novel to the screen would be no simple one, even for so capable a man as Capra.

Briefly, the story of "Lost Horizon" concerns five persons who are kidnaped in an airplane in China, and flown deep into the heart of Forbidden Tibet. Picked up by a caravan headed by a mystic and elderly Chinese, they are escorted to what is perhaps the most unusual place on the face of the earth—the lamastery of Shangri-La.

Setting Unusual Here, cloistered securely by mountains impenetrable to the uninitiated, is a setting of indescribable beauty and serenity, peopled by members of the strangest sort of modern times. Romance and adventure fall to the bewildered kidnaped victims, and soon, all but on surrender to the utter contentment and rare loveliness that is Shangri-La.

"When Love Is Young" Has Charm; Virginia Bruce Says It's Her Best

Though she has been a screen notable these several seasons, Virginia Bruce considers "When Love Is Young" her "first picture." In this romantic Universal comedy with music, coming to the Hollywood theatre today, she tops a cast in a sympathetic role for the first time, after doing numerous second leads and menacing beauties. She also dances for the first time. And for the first time she is photographed without makeup.

"When Love Is Young" is the screen version of Eleanor Griffin McCall's magazine story, "Class Prophecy." It presents Miss Bruce as Wanda Werner, a farmer's daughter whose high school classmates can prophecy no better future for her than someday raising the biggest pumpkin for the state fair. Instead she goes to Broadway under convoy of her uncle, acted by Walter Brennan, character actor who has just won the 1936 academy award for the best masculine supporting role of the year. Miss Bruce becomes a singing star and falls in love with Kent Taylor, as a brash young press agent, all of which brings on the film's surprise climax.

Miss Bruce sings two songs in this picture. They were written specially for her by Jimmy McHugh and Harold Adamson who did the score for Universal's current musical, "Top of the Town." Nick Long, stellar dancer of stage and screen, is her partner in her first dance before the camera. Air Mail Flower Show Is Planned

Every state in the union, plus a number of foreign points, will be represented in Portland's second annual air mail rose show to be held in conjunction with the rose festival there, June 9 to 12, inclusive, according to word received here by Postmaster H. R. Crawford.

Postmaster Crawford reported that advance notice of plans to exhibit already have been received from fifty cities and this number is expected to be more than doubled by the time the show is held. Points planning to participate include such distant centers as Portland, Maine; Miami, Fla.; Edmonton, Canada, and San Juan, Puerto Rico.

New and fast schedules of United Air Lines will enable shippers to get their blooms to Portland overnight either from the Atlantic seaboard or southern California, with virtually no city in the country more than a day away from Portland under present air mail times.

Entries will compete for trophies offered by a number of leading hotels as well as for numerous ribbons and lesser awards. Prizes for the best general exhibit and for exhibits sent the longest distance will be included. Either field grown or greenhouse roses are eligible for entry.
