

Seven Classes To Be Judged

Best Trained Dog Contest Is new feature for Coming Display

SCIO, June 7.—Details have been completed for the third annual fat lamb show to be staged here Saturday, June 12. A new feature this year will be prizes of \$5 and \$3 for first and second best trained dogs to corral sheep.

Portable pens for exhibits are at the disposal of the management of the show. These facilities will be wholly adequate for the event this year.

Under the rules exhibits are to be entered by 9:30 a.m., June 12. This arrangement will incorporate a scope that will encourage production of prize lambs, of which the Scio community has exhibited notable samples in connection with this movement in the past.

Classes A and D have to do with the best pen of three lambs; classes B and E, best single lamb; class C, best big lamb; classes F and G, best bottle lamb. Prizes range from \$8.50 to \$1.00, totaling \$110 for all events.

Classes for 4-H's. Classes D, E, F and G are calculated exclusively for 4-H club members, the last named division being for boys and girls under 18 years.

It is specifically arranged by the committee that lambs in class A cannot compete in class B, and that exhibits in class D cannot be entered for competition in class E. Prize-winning lambs are to be auctioned.

Prizes in the sheep-shearing contest run from \$5 to \$1.

The Cherry City Baking company of Salem will have its public address car here during the days of the festival.

Various sports are planned, and the day will conclude with a dance in the evening.

Judges will be H. Lindgren, O.S.C.; R. L. Clarke, Portland; F. C. Mullen, county agent. The general committee is Jess Rodgers, chairman; Leland Miller, J. D. Densmore, sr., Kyrer Cain, George Patry, Con Donahue.

Riggs not Guilty, Finds Second Jury

But on Failure-to-Stop Is Fined \$50 After He Admits Guilt

WOODBURN, June 7.—Delbert Lewis Riggs was given a second trial in Judge Overton's court on the charge of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor and was found not guilty by the jury consisting of Fred S. Hall, Guy Warwick, E. H. Scholes, Clarence Wampole, B. W. Stoner and A. W. Kraus.

He was later arrested on complaint of G. Halter charged with failing to stop after an accident and appeared in court where he entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$50 to be paid June 19.

Other cases in court the past week include: Arthur Krutz, arrested for passing another car on the right, fined \$10 and costs; Lee Roy May and Chester Monroe May, arrested for peeling casaca bark and destroying trees on the property of the Horst company, waived preliminary hearing and were held to answer to the circuit court with bail fixed at \$250 each which they were unable to furnish. They were committed to the county jail.

Other Fines Levied. Herbert C. Curtis paid a fine of \$10 and costs for passing another car traveling in the same direction without sufficient clearance. Otto Alpanalp paid a fine of \$5 and costs for driving a truck at the speed of 46 miles per hour. Jimmie Clyde Phillips paid \$5 and costs for allowing four persons over the age of 12 years to ride in the drivers seat; James Merle Poe paid \$5 and costs for driving without a muffler.

Arnold Holmes paid \$5 and costs for driving a truck at a speed of 45 miles per hour.

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
