

Grange Hears National Head

Plan for Agriculture Is Offered; Resolutions Passed, Convention

THE DALLES, June 10.—(AP)—Louis J. Taber, national grange master, told 1500 delegates to the state grange convention today that business, labor and agriculture must form a trinity and work for common ends if the American system is to survive in this "age of speed."

Taber said agriculture must be included in any forward looking program, as history has shown no nation can prosper with farmers verging on insolvency.

The grange leader outlined a three-point program for agriculture. First, he said, farmers must take full advantage of research and scientific methods to keep pace with the fast tempo of the age, second, cooperation of all groups is essential, and third, legislative and economic equality must be assured.

Taber scored collective farming and corporation methods of agriculture as "unthinkable" un-

der the American system. He urged greater equality in taxation and said federal and state employees should be made to pay income taxes.

Fears Higher Taxes
The grange head warned that present taxes, although high, would be mild in comparison to what might prevail some future day when the mounting national debt was paid off.

A quoted statement of Gov. Martin that "we are taking care of the aged and the unemployed from the profits of liquor but we still need about one million dollars more than can be raised if the boys increase their thirst," was condemned in a resolution which said the remark was "un-called for, tending to create sentiment for an increase in the use of liquor and disregard of temperance."

Other resolutions urging the teaching of the pathogenic effects of alcohol on the human system in state schools; an active campaign against a referendum holding up enforcement of the Martin and Carney anti-pin-tail bills; a civilian administrator for Bonneville dam in complete charge of generating facilities; a transition system in the Bonneville area so that farmers may receive full benefits of cheap power; a postage stamp rate for power rather than a zone plan, and enactment of the
