## Bend Awarded Next Tourney

M. G. Henkle new Doubles Champ; Young Bradley Wins Martin Cup

Pass took a lead for the Oregon singles championship in the state trapshoot here as he defeated Jim Morris of Portland in a shoot-off for the Earl Snell 100 singles.

Five men broke 100 in the singles and Morris and Mendenhall battled it out through their 125th round before the Grants Pass scattergun experts won out. Herman R. Peterson of Los Angeles and F. L. Dambacher of Walnut Grove went out of the shoot-off in their 50th rounds. Kehn Wain of Salem defaulted in the shoot-off.

Glenn Bradley, Pendleton youth, captured the governor's handicap, in which Governor Charles H. Martin fired the opening shot, by downing two other shooters in a 25 round shoot-off. Bradley, R. T. Flaherty of Spokane and A. Amador of Longview all broke 86 out of 100 birds in the regular handicap event.

M. G. Henkle of Pendleton won the state doubles championship by shattering 47 targets out of 25 pair. His mark was equalled by George Young of Buckley, Wash., and O. S. Ballou of Wenatchee, who as out-of-state entrants were ineligible for the championship.

Got to Bend in '38

Bend will be the scene of the 1938 Oregon state trapshoot, members of the state trapshooting association decided at their annual meeting last night after Portland, which also won the sponsorship of the shoot, withdrew in favor of the Deschutes county city.

Vic Plath and Dr. J. C. Vandervert led the delegation from Bend which urged the trapshooters to hold the state shoot there.

Clarence Townsend of Salem was elected president of the state association. Dr. J. C. Vandervert of Bend was elected vice-president and Jim Morris of Portland re-elected secretary.

Directors named for the ensuing year are George Pick, Portland; C. G. Hillbrand, Independence; S. G. Mendenhall, Grants Pass; Ray Glass, Eugene; C. D. Ray, Marshfield; Angus McAllister, La Grande, and Vic Plath, Bend.

Seven Near Perfect

Seven entrants turned in cards of 99 in the singles event. They included the veteran Frank Troeh of Portland and his son E. E. Troeh, Portland professional, A. R. Harrott of Portland, J. W. Shaw of Woodburn, Atr Boehan of Spokane, C. F. Vining of Sacramento and E. C. Griffin of Seattle.

Secretary of State Earl Snell, donor of the cup in the singles event, surprised the field by carding a 97.

C. D. Ray of Marshfield shattered 46 out of 50 in the doubles while F. M. Troeh, last year's champion, stopped at 45.

Final events on today's program include the finals of the state telegraphic competition and the last half of the state singles championship. The Oregon State handicap, one of the biggest of trapshooting events, will climax the shoot this afternoon.

BERKELEY, Calif., June 12-(AP)—The entry list for the National Collegiate A.A. track and field championships here June 13 and 14 reached the impressive total of 239 contestants today but while a wild scramble for points was forecast, University of Southern California was a solid favorite to retain its team title.

The Trojan challenge to retain team supremacy, resting on the shoulders of 19 athletes, became more pointed with the withdrawal of University of Indiana's great distance runner — Don Lash.

Lash decided to pass up the N.C.A.A. competition in favor of the Princeton invitational meet the same week-end. The decision virtually deducted 20 points from Indiana's scoring probabilities. He would have been the stand-out favorite to win the mile and two-mile runs while the team-mates, Jim Smith and Tom Deckard, competing in the same events, were expected to build up the Hoosier total to more than 40 talled.

Meanwhile, 18 points were conceded Coach Dean Cromwell's U.S.C. Trojans in the pole vault with Bill Smith and Earle Meadows capable of starting in at heights where the others leave off.

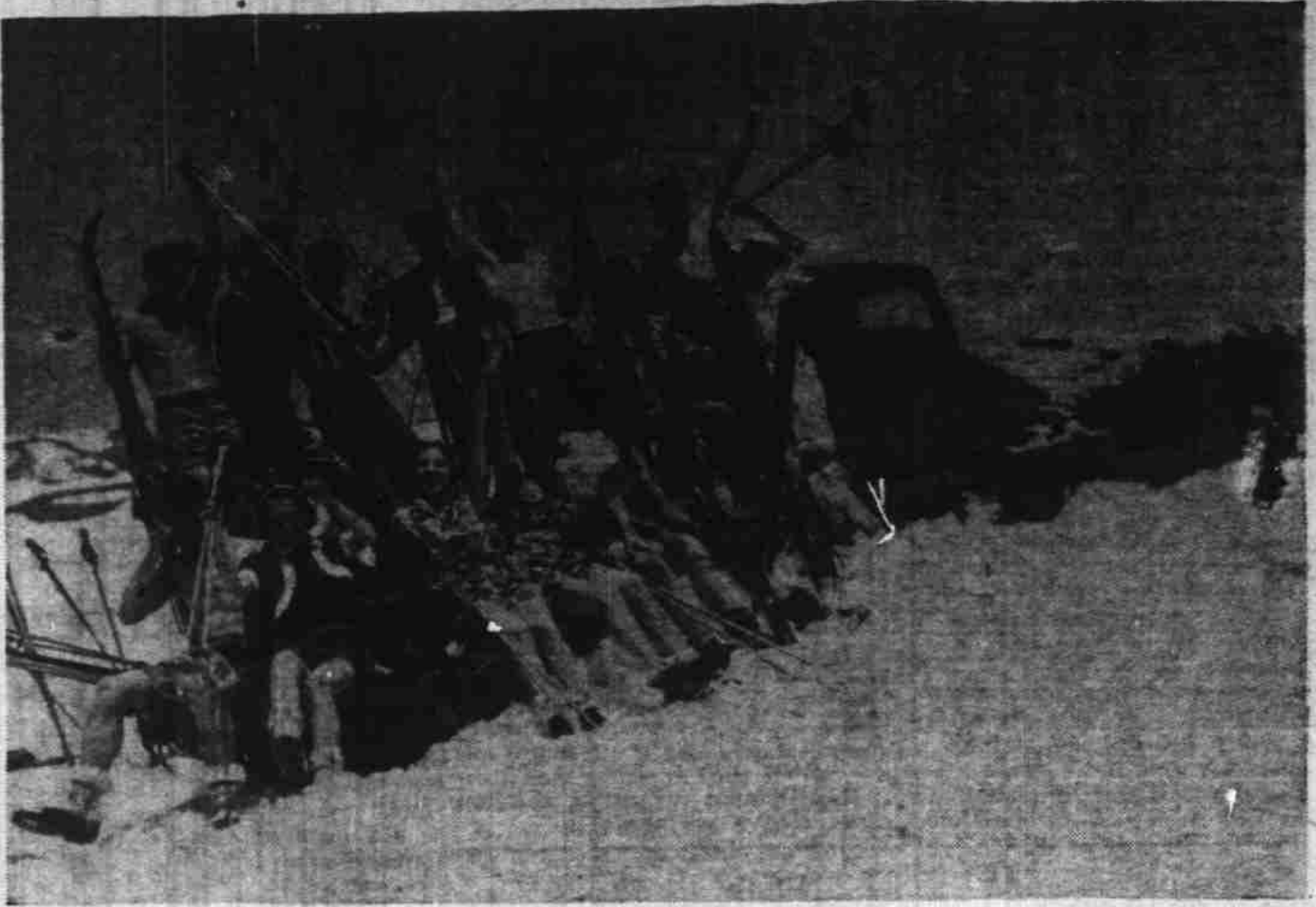

## Seven Under Par; Snead Is Second When Putting Stroke Fails Him

BIRMINGHAM, Mich., June 12-(AP)—Big, stoop-shouldered Ralph Guldahl, the man who "called" his comeback shots, climaxed an epic golf struggle today with a record-smashing triumph in the 41st open championship of the United States.

The 25-year-old Chicago free-lance professional, so destitute a year ago that a friend helped him get his clubs "out of hock," came from behind in miraculous finish to post a world record aggregate of 281 for big time competition.

In capturing the open title the Texas-born giant whipped Old Man Par by seven full shots over the historic Oakland Hills layout, led his nearest rival, slammer Sam Snead, by two strokes, and slipped a shot from the former world and American open champion record of 282, set a year ago at Baltusrol by Tony Manero.

Guldahl registered successive rounds of 71, 69, 72 and 69. A gallery of nearly 8000 spectators was wild with excitement.

Guldahl's final round was a rare combination of courageous recoveries and miracle shotmaking after Snead, the boy wonder from the hills of West Virginia, had posted a near-record total of 283.

Showing Remarkable Snead's 69-73-70-71 for the tournament represented an amazing freshman performance and (Turn to page 8, col. 3)
