Community Chest Plan Is Voted; 5 Agencies may Participate

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sons who had served as temporary officers; W. M. Hamilton, president; Douglas McKay, first vice-president; Oscar D. Olson, second vice-president; Linn Smith, treasurer. To this group was added A. Warren Jones, secretary.

It was voted that the executive committee should consist of these officers and the representatives of the participating organizations; A. C. Haag for the Boy Scouts, William McGilchrist, Jr., for the Salvation Army; C. A. Sprague for the Y. M. C. A. and Mrs. Karl Becke for the Y. W. C. A. Linn Smith, treasurer, is the Red Cross representative.

Proposal to hold the community chest campaign in October, or perhaps starting a week earlier, was made, but the definite dates will be determined later.

In the general meeting, the temporary officers presented the results of extensive investigation into the success of community chest organizations in other cities, which showed that a large majority were successful.

More Contributions, General Experience

One of the most impressive sets of comparative figures revealed that when welfare campaigns were conducted by a community chest, the number of individual contributors was in many cases more than doubled, even though the total amount raised was not much greater than in separate drives previously, indicating that the welfare cost load on each citizen was smaller.

Discussion brought out that in most cities, if the Red Cross participates, the Red Cross membership funds are handled separately although paid to the community chest solicitors; and that the regular Y. M. C. A. memberships which privileges in the Y. building are given in return, are not connected in any way with the community chest.

CORVALLIS, June 15.—(P)—S. C. Jones, assistant entomologist of the Oregon experiment station, issued an "emergency announcement" that cherry fruit flies have been emerging in cages in Lane, Benton and Polk counties since June 7.

He warned that all varieties of cherries and interplanted trees and brush along fence rows should be sprayed at once.

PORTLAND, June 15.—(P)—Louis DeCicco, 21, and his 17-year-old bride, the former Princess Donabelle James of the Portland rose festival, headed toward Hollywood today on their honeymoon while parents of the couple voiced protests to the marriage, performed early Sunday morning in Vancouver, Wash., following the queen's ball.

The bridegroom, whose father, Mike DeCicco, is prominent in democratic affairs here, claims relationship to Pat DeCicco, Hollywood actor, and to be a friend of Leo Carillo, film comedian. The elder DeCicco said he thought the young people were joking when they first informed him of the marriage, and until the bride displayed the wedding ring. Last night he conferred with Lloyd James, father of the bride, and said the two agreed the couple was too young and the girl did not realize what she was doing. He said the couple called him last night, enroute to the south, and the bride declared her intention of "sticking with Louis."

Oil Workers Die In Derrick Crash

OKEMAH, Okla., June 15.—(P)—Three oil field workers were reported killed tonight when a rig well northwest of here collapsed during a windstorm, crushing them in the wreckage.

OKLAHOMA CITY, June 15.—(P)—Torrential rains, electrical storms and floods spread ruin tonight over Oklahoma's promising wheat crop, already delayed in its harvest by heavy June downpours. An electrical storm which accompanied a 2.5-inch downpour at Oklahoma City fired gas from at least 15 oil wells in the northeast Oklahoma City field. The gas was cut off without damage.

McColloch Attack Sent to Senators

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(P)—Senators who will be in a position to pass on the appointment of a federal judge in Oregon received copies of a printed attack on Claude McColloch, democratic state chairman, who has been prominently mentioned for the position.

The missive, signed by Grace M. Charlton, Tillamook, Ore., criticizes alleged activities of McColloch and Oswald West in the days of the spruce division in Oregon, and refers to him as being employed as attorney for the California-Oregon Power company.

Maier Resigns as Lutheran Editor

PORTLAND, June 15.—(P)—The resignation of the Rev. J. P. Maier of Walla Walla as editor of the Lutheran "Messenger" marked the close of the annual convention of the Oregon and Washington district of the Evangelical Lutheran synod of Missouri here today.

LONDON, June 15.—(P)—Paced by red-thatched Don Budge, American representatives in the Queen's club tennis tournament fared well today, losing only two members in the advance to the third round of the singles and in the opening doubles' tests.

Budge, taking only 18 minutes to eliminate J. Van Den Eynde of Belgium, 6-0, 6-3, stroked his way through the second round along with Hal Surface of Kansas City, Charles Harris of West Palm Beach, Fla., and his Davis cup teammates, Bryan Grant, Wayne Sabin and Gene Mark. America's No. 1 player also paired with Makro to score a second round doubles triumph from Henry Bellington and J. F. G. Lysaght, 6-4, 7-5.

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Roosevelt made his announcement.

A company spokesman, however, when informed of the president's verbal "intervention," said that "it still goes."

Mayor Swears in 250 "Vigilantes" With tension in Johnstown rapidly heightening, Mayor Daniel J. Shields swore in 250 "vigilantes" and sent them out at nightfall to patrol the streets. He said he would have "500 deputies under arms" by tomorrow.

A citizens' committee, meanwhile, had threatened to "shoulder arms and drive the invaders out of town."

Gov. George H. Earle doubled the force of state troopers along the picket lines, but some residents of this "city of nerves" took their own precautions.

Hundreds of Bethlehem steel workers, defiant against the C. I. O. drive to shut down the plants until a labor contract is signed, guarded their homes with firearms against the latest terror of the big steel strike—night marauders.

Armed with shotguns, they waited on darkened porches and in upper-story windows for any return of roving bands of hoodlums who stoned dwellings and shouted threats in the dead of night.

Swift-breaking developments marked the day at other salients on the seven-state strike front—where more than 100,000 men have been thrown out of work in the bitter labor war between C. I. O. and independent steel companies.

Paramount in importance were these: 1. At Detroit, Homer Martin, head of the United Automobile Workers of America, disclosed a strategic move which may plunge the giant automobile industry into the war on steel.

May Refuse to Use Strike Plant Steel

"We are standing by," he wired C. I. O. headquarters in Washington, D. C., "ready to refuse to use steel made in struck plants in the production of automobiles unless the steel companies make a speedy and amicable settlement with the striking steel workers."

2. At Columbus, O., a peace move by Gov. Martin L. Dwyer collapsed as steel spokesmen said their opposition to a signed labor contract with the steel workers' organizing committee was "unchanged."

3. A dynamite blast, destroying 80 feet of track, interrupted railroad operations at Ohio Republic steel plants on the Ashtabula-Niles branch of the Pennsylvania railroad.

Grand Coulee Dam Completion Nears

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(P)—Reclamation Commissioner John C. Page announced today construction of the giant Grand Coulee dam on the Columbia river in central Washington is more than a year ahead of schedule.

Foundation work, he said, probably will be completed by January.

Page said the 3,500th cubic yard of concrete would be poured today.

Cornerstone Box Committee Named

PORTLAND, June 15.—(P)—J. A. McLean, chairman of the capitol reconstruction commission, named his fellow commissioners, Dr. E. C. Dalton and T. H. Banfield, and E. B. Wage Bill Rapped, Non-Merit System

WASHINGTON, June 15.—(P)—The Black-Connery legislation to establish compulsory labor standards drew some sharp, critical words from the civil service commission today because it would create many government jobs outside the merit system.

The commission gave its views in a letter to the joint congressional labor committee, which is holding hearings on the wage-hour bill.

"No positions of any consequence are included within the merit system and all of the principal and even minor supervisory positions are exempted under the bill," the letter said.

Hearings on the Black-Connery measure drew near a close today.

Sidney Hillman, president of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, gave unqualified endorsement to the bill and said he did not agree with John L. Lewis, committee for industrial organization chief, that one section of the measure was a "threat to collective bargaining."

Hillman's organization is a C. I. O. affiliate.

After nearly brushing the tree tops in the first try, Ives climbed the ship to about 2,000 feet and ordered Brostrom to jump.

Descending, Brostrom said, his parachute caught in the top of a tall tree, 200 feet from the ground. He descended the tree trunk with the aid of a silk scarf he was wearing.

Henry Parks, who lived near the scene of the crash, had seen Brostrom fall out and assisted him in descending from the tree.

The two searched vainly for the wrecked plane before summoning help from Yoncalla.

The crash occurred shortly after 7 p. m.

"Thursday afternoon, June 17, has been designated as the day for the laying of the cornerstone of the new state capitol building, and in my opinion is the most memorable event that has taken place in the history of Salem. Salem having enjoyed the privilege of being the capitol city of the state for these many years should accordingly pay due respect to the historical value of this cornerstone laying, and appropriately recognize the same."

"I urge that all places of business in the city be closed between the hours of 1 and 3 p. m., so that everyone will be able to witness the ceremonies that will be in reality the foundation laying of the statehouse that will be the center of our state government for generations to come."
