Program at Capitol Set Promptly at 2 p.m.; all in Readiness

Salem, host to the many visitors attracted by the ceremony which should have no counterpart in the present century, will also take on a holiday appearance shortly after noon, for all public offices, including the city hall, will close at 1 p.m. and remain closed until 3 o'clock when the public observance of the day will end.

In connection with the arrival of the Masonic group, there will be a parade starting from the armory at 1:30 p.m., headed by the 186th Infantry band from Portland and the Salem Choralians, followed by the uniformed bodies of the Masonic grand lodge. The parade route will follow a course similar to that of the similar parade in 1873 when Masonic groups conducted corner-stone laying exercises for the old capitol.

Ceremonies Begin Promptly at 2 p.m.

But the cornerstone laying itself will be the day's crowning event. Promptly at 2 o'clock the formal ceremonies will begin, promptness being a matter of necessity for a specific half hour has been allotted to them on a nation-wide radio hookup which may be heard here on station KEX.

The cornerstone will be the last stage of the marble exterior of the capitol to be put into place; the first small rectangle of the visible portion of what will be Oregon's completed state-house.

Relief Bill May Stop Work, Says

If the relief bill now in the senate, making it necessary for sponsors of WPA projects to provide 40 per cent of the cost paid, projects now under way or planned in Salem and vicinity, would be in danger of being lost, J. E. Smith of the Salem office for the WPA asserted yesterday.

All projects that use little material but much hand labor would be doomed, in Smith's opinion. This would include the city park near the Deaconess hospital on South Winter street, landscaping of the new school grounds, some road work, playground WPA projects, and possibly the water system at Dallas.

Projects on which sponsors in the Salem area are already furnishing 40 per cent or over of the total cost are in no danger, he said. They include the D street sewer, city street work, all buildings such as the flat plants at Mt. Angel and Springfield, the city hall at St. Paul, and the building projects on U. of O., Monmouth, and O. S. C. camps.

ALBANY, June 16. (AP)—A man walked into the police station here today and said he wanted to surrender as a parole violator from Anamosa reformatory, Iowa. He said his name was Emil Emmeringer and his home Chicago. He gave his age as 24.

He told police he had served three years of a 10-year sentence for house breaking and was paroled to his father in 1934, and that after several attempts to settle down, fear of being caught caused him to decide to complete his sentence.

Digger Turns up Tusk of Mammoth

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died sometime between 2000 and 5000 years ago.

These findings were about the size of the largest circus elephants of today, but were much fiercer in nature. The tusk found yesterday must have been five feet in length before broken.

Professor Clark said. There is some evidence that the mammoths shared this country for a time with the first Indian tribes. Many tusks have been found, at Champeo, Dallas, and other nearby points. The skeletons, less durable, have vanished.

Aviation Safety Plans in Making

Commander Rosendahl to Attend Air Council at Boise Today

BOISE, Idaho, June 16. (AP)—A behind-the-scenes story of the world's greatest air disaster—the explosion of the dirigible Hindenburg—may furnish the basis for a new formula for aviation safety.

From the lips of naval air station Commander C. E. Rosendahl of Lakeland, N. J., will be given to the conference of the northwest aviation planning council here details of the Hindenburg blast.

"Commander Rosendahl insisted," said Walter R. York of Boise, chairman of the council committee that drafted arrangements for the conference, "that he wanted a full hour's time on our program."

"He has assured us that he will give, in detail, the behind-the-scenes story of the Von Hindenburg crash."

Gill Robb Wilson, New Jersey state director of aviation and member of the three-man advisory committee on lighter-than-air transportation, will explain work that is underway for the training and education of aviation personnel.

Future trends in aircraft design will be delineated by C. N. Montell of Seattle, vice-president of Boeing Aircraft Corp. Montell is the designer of a new 40-passenger, four-motored plane now being produced for use on a transcontinental air route.

The northwest aviation planning council—the only one of its kind in America—was formed at Spokane in May, 1935. Its second meeting was held last December at Portland, Ore.
