

Showdown Due, Issue of C. I. O.

Woodworkers Officers to Meet Saturday; Some Rejecting Vote

SEATTLE, June 17 (AP)—A showdown on the controversy over the American Federation of Labor and the Committee for Industrial Organization inside the Federation of Woodworkers was promised tonight at a federation district council officers' conference in Longview Saturday. It has about 100,000 members.

William Hutchison, president of the Carpenters and Joiners' International, is scheduled to propose that the federation remain within the A.F.O.L. Harold Pritchett, federation president, favoring the C. I. O., said he would attend although not invited.

Pritchett, in an interview here today, assailed district councils including the Puget Sound district council, for withholding from their membership ballots on which to determine A.F.O.L. or C.I.O. affiliation.

Balloting Under Way
The federation authorized such a referendum to be completed by July 10, and Pritchett said the balloting is under way in the Columbia River district, Coos Bay, British Columbia, Grays and Willapa Harbors, at Klamath Falls and in Minnesota, and by the large plywood workers group.

He criticized what he said were "unscrupulous methods of officers of district councils in blocking our forward path." John Stanloch, president of the Puget Sound district council, told interviewers Pritchett was attempting to become a dictator. Stanloch said the men should have more time to consider before being required to ballot and "leap into the C.I.O. without seeing what the American Federation of Labor has to offer."

Stanloch said several district councils and the Shingleweavers' union have refused to issue the ballots. He said the entire matter will be threshed out at the Puget Sound district council convention at Port Angeles July 10-11. "Until we hear both sides, there will be no vote here," was Stanloch's concluding ultimatum.

Naming of Board Shoots Steels up

Motors and Other Leaders Also Gain as Earlier Losses Converted

NEW YORK, June 17 (AP)—Appointment of a federal mediation board in the steel strike today brought a substantial rally in steels, motors and other stock market leaders.

Losses of fractions to 3 or more points suffered in an early selling wave were converted into gains of as much in many instances in the final hour.

It was far from a one-way ride, however, and numerous issues were in arrears at the close.

Volume was largest during the morning slide when for a brief period the ticker tape was behind floor dealings. The pace was only moderate on the recovery move.

Transfers totaled 1,259,100 shares compared with 898,630 yesterday. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was up .6 of a point at 64.6.

Of \$29 issues traded \$61 advanced, \$69 declined and 168 were unchanged.

That the financial sector may not be so downhearted as appearances have indicated was seen in the sale of a stock exchange seat for \$39,000, up \$4,000.
