concerns at which C. I. O. leaders claimed employees had voted to strike, said they planned to carry on normal operations tomorrow.

The union protest was also aimed against the movement of non-strikers in and out of the Republic steel plant under protection of national guard rifles and machine guns.

The guardsmen were ordered into the Mahoning valley by Gov. Martin L. Davey yesterday. Photographer Surrounded, Camera Smashed

With rifles lowered, they came running toward a crowd of several hundred C. I. O. strikers who had surrounded a Chicago Times newspaper photographer, seized his camera and smashed it.

The crowd retreated, booing and shouting.

Coupled with the C. I. O.-announced general strike, a statement by John McKeown, C. I. O. organizer, that "a march by 50,000 union men from other cities might be called to protest alleged discrimination against strikers" at a time of apprehension among authorities tonight.

At the same time, in Cleveland, Frank Purnell, president of president of Youngstown Sheet & Tube, admitted that despite the renewed day-long efforts of President Roosevelt's federal mediation board to effect a solution, the situation in the 28-day-old steel strike remained "unchanged."

The wide-spread labor controversy already has cost an estimated \$12,000,000 and 12 lives. Secretary Perkins Says Progress Being Made

In Washington Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins announced: "Federal mediators are making very fine progress toward a solution."

Nevertheless, the prime matter in dispute—the question of signed labor contracts—remained a stone wall blocking the path of the federal peace-seekers.

Steel executives stood unflinchingly in their refusal to sign on the dotted line with John L. Lewis, C. I. O., and there was not the faintest indication the C. I. O. generalissimo would yield an inch.

The seven-state strike front, where more than 100,000 men have been set idle in the "show-down" clash between Lewis and the four independent steel companies developed a new "hot spot" at Warren today.

Strikers' Presence
Smouldering for three days—since Judge Lynn B. Griffith granted Republic an injunction restraining picket activities—the steel strikers' resentment boiled to the surface this morning when the newly-arrived national guardsmen escorted non-strikers from the Republic plant where they have been based since May 26.

Swiftly, C. I. O. leaders sent out emergency calls to 28 union locals. The leaders claimed that the sympathy movement involving, they said, both C. I. O. and A. F. of L. workers would make "15,000 men idle in Warren by tomorrow."

The unionists, they said, are employed in 12 industrial plants and include steel, telephone, electrical and WPA workers.

In another move in the long-angled strike controversy, U. S. Commissioner W. J. Tamm issued warrants at Akron, O., for the arrest of six men charged with "interference with United States mails."

President Roosevelt himself kept in almost constant telephonic communication with principals in the dispute.

Hutton to Attend Fire Chiefs' Meet

MEDFORD, June 23.—(P)—The 18th annual convention of the Oregon State Fire Chiefs' association will open a two-day session here tomorrow, with Jay I. Stevens, fire marshal for the state of California, as one of the principal speakers.

Guest speakers from three other states will augment the program to be presented an estimated 200 fire chiefs from Oregon. L. L. Mohr, The Dalles, state president, will open the session.

Santander Goal Of Franco Drive

PORTUGALETE, Spain, June 23.—(AP)—The insurgent tide rolled westward from Bilbao tonight toward Santander, last important city held by the Basques.

So powerful was the new insurgent advance that officers expected to conquer Valmaseda, first main objective, within two days. Valmaseda is west and south of Bilbao, about a third of the distance to Santander.

Portugalete was a rich prize. The town is jammed with factories, smelters and coal and iron ore deposits. Its wharves were lined with tugs, freighters and barges.

Government troops held out until the very last. They dynamited the peculiar bridge linking Portugalete with Las Arenas, across the estuary.

Every night for a week, Basque snipers along the Portugalete shore took pot shots at the advancing insurgents. A number of buildings were burned, and much of the population was evacuated.

Button Sale for Air Circus, Plan

14 Dead, 44 Hurt In Trinidad Riots

PORT-OF-SPAIN, Trinidad, June 23.—(P)—The toll of Trinidad's strike riots mounted to 14 dead and 44 injured today as additional reports came from the interior of the island, crippled by a strike of more than 5000 oil workers.

Clashes between strikers and armed authorities added new casualties to the list in the strike's fourth day.

Workers demanded increased wages on the basis of higher living costs, but a government statement declared "advantage of the situation has been taken by agitators."

Marines from the British cruiser mounted machine guns to guard strategic points of the island and its rich oil fields.

The walkout spread to sugar plantations, but appeared to make no further progress in Port-of-Spain where stores reopened for business this morning.

During the height of disturbances, a mob burned the railway station at Rio Claro, ripped up the railway tracks, and severed all communication lines. Wire-spread property damage has been reported throughout the island.

CORVALLIS, June 23.—(AP)—Using Japan, China and Korea as a laboratory, a party of 23 Oregon State college summer session students and instructors will board the Empress of Russia at Vancouver, B. C., Saturday, June 26, bound for Tokyo.

After two months study the party will return on the Empress of Japan, stopping briefly at Hawaiian points, reaching the United States August 24.

The foreign secretary faced three problems:

1. Constitution of a new control scheme;
2. Smoothing out of Anglo-German relations;

3. New consideration of the question of granting belligerent rights to the Spanish insurgent regime.

Officials in Rome declared Italy by today's action was taking her warships from the patrol but it was understood she was leaving the Spanish waters in virtually the same areas as before.

In Barcelona, Gen. Sebastian Pozas, commander of the Catalan forces of the Spanish government, reported he had ordered warplanes to protect a British freighter that had appealed for aid against an Italian warship.

Britain's Next Step

Not Disclosed

There was no indication of Britain's next immediate step.

The government sent new instructions to its warships off the Basque coast to protect ships carrying refugees from Santander and Bilbao.

It was stipulated the refugees may be only women and children. Insurgent Gen. Francisco Franco, it was disclosed, protested to London that the British steamer Marlan Moller carried refugees of military age.

BERLIN, June 23.—(P)—Reichswehr Adolf Hitler demonstrated his determination tonight to maintain German naval forces in Spanish waters by ordering the vest-pocket battleship Graf Spee to proceed immediately to Spain.

Hitler Said Acting

"Against Firebrands"

The warship sailed shortly after the German cabinet met to discuss the declaration of the government had decided to take into its own hands "the protection of its interests and ships against Bolshevik firebrands in Valencia."

Dispatch of the Graf Spee was interpreted by some to mean that Germany will pursue a more vigorous course than before toward Spain despite advice of some of Hitler's counselors that he risk no more ships in Spanish waters.

It was authoritatively learned Germany will send 18 warships in Spanish waters and also a number of "converted fishing vessels" carrying navy crews.

The government said that it had only one interest in Spain—that "a truly independent and free Spain may rise again and that it will succeed in healing grievous wounds inflicted by the Bolshevik civil war."

Virgin Mary Role Related by Girl

LOS ANGELES, June 23.—(P)—Seventeen-year-old Delight Jewett of Denver re-told with more detail today her version of how—as a drafted modern-day "Virgin Mary"—she had been prepared to give birth to a "new redeemer" in the Father Divine cult movement.

She testified at the federal court trial of chubby John Wuest Hunt, 33, and three others, followers of the New York negro cult master, on Mann act charges. They are accused of bringing her to Beverly Hills for immoral purposes.

Miss Jewett said that at the time she charges Hunt first betrayed her last Christmas eve, she was told it was for the purpose of giving birth to a child.

Hunt told her enroute from Denver she was to become the mother of a new redeemer by immaculate conception, she testified. She said this was after Hunt and the others already had cast her in the role of the Virgin Mary.
