Redding, in northern California, reported 101 degrees, and in Washington, Spokane had 91, Seattle 82 and Tacoma 83.

Seeking relief from the sticky weather, Russell Fortis, 24, of Portland, was drowned about noon yesterday in Five Mile lake. Police were informed Fortis sank when he slipped off a board he was using to keep him afloat. He could not swim. The body was recovered in about seven feet of water.

Elsie Fricklin, 21, lost her life in the surf near Cannon beach when a huge wave and undertow carried her out to sea. Her companion, Gilles O'Callaghan, battled the breakers and made his way to the beach.

The girl's home is at Pendleton and she was working at Cannon beach during the summer as a beauty operator. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Fricklin, were weekending at the beach. Her body had not been recovered.

In the Tualatin river, Herman Alsen, 30, of Metzger, sank to his death when he went in swimming Sunday following a heavy dinner. William McKenna, 23, was drowned at Delake despite the efforts of two unnamed swimmers to help him. McKenna had gone to the coast with a crowd of young people from the Assumption Parish of St. Johns.

Near Klamath Falls a father and son met death in the Lost River. Charles Morrison, 45, drowned before the eyes of Mrs. Morrison in a futile attempt to save his son, Willie, 11, who was helpless in the water.

Lem King, 17, vacationing on Coos river near Marshfield, from his home near Baker, was drowned while in swimming.

Two Young Men in Auto Resembling That in Case, Picked up

were horrible bruises on her face, and her mouth was cut and bruised. Ed Muir, captain of detectives, said the slayings were the "crime of one man, a sexual degenerate; we believe we know who he is, and that he will be arrested eventually."

Dr. A. F. Wagner, county autopsy surgeon, reported after a cursory examination that all three girls had been ravished and then choked to death. He expressed belief they were killed Saturday afternoon.

A troop of Boy Scouts, which was among the 500 police and volunteer searchers who combed the rolling hills all last night and today, came upon the bodies late today.

The children were lying in a straight line on the sandy bottom of the ravine, about 25 yards from each other. They were barefoot. Their clothing was disarranged, their tiny dresses pulled up above their heads.

On the bank of the ravine, searchers found three pairs of little shoes, all side by side, as though placed there by the tots before venturing below.

Simultaneously with the discovery, Capt. William Penprase of the sheriff's bureau of investigation sent a statewide teletype broadcast asking authorities to pick up Othel Leroy Strong, 22. The broadcast stated that Strong is wanted on suspicion of kidnapping the three Inglewood girls June 25. The message said the man probably was driving a 1929 or 1930 Ford roadster, minus running boards, fenders and top.

Inglewood police said Strong was convicted last year of assaulting a girl but was granted probation.

The three children were last seen alive Saturday morning while playing in Centinella park, near their home. Neighbors saw them talking to an unidentified man attired in overalls and brown shirt.

Shortly afterward the girls informed the matron of the park swimming pool, Mrs. Nell Crawford, that they were going rabbit hunting with the man in the An-geles hills.

When the children failed to return home Saturday night, their distraught parents notified police. A county-wide search was started Sunday, continuing last night and today.

Miller Saves Chickens, Also Gets Cougar Bounty

running from December 23 to January 2, inclusive, according to the year's calendar, adopted last night. School will open September 13. Other holidays will include one day not yet selected in September, for teachers' institute; Armistice day; November 25, 26, 27 and 28, Thanksgiving; Easter vacation, April 15 to 18, inclusive; and Memorial day. School will close June 3.

The board fixed the salary of Clerk W. H. Burghardt at \$110 a month, an increase of approximately 20 per cent to correspond with advances granted teachers in the last three years. During the building program period, to end July 1, Burghardt has been paid \$150 a month because of additional duties in the way of book-keeping and handling of PWA documents.

The finance committee was asked to recommend salaries for Harold Hawk and Gurnee Fleisher, playground directors, whose old rates of pay, \$90 a month, are now less than salaries paid school janitors under newly-granted increases.

Superintendent Silas Gaiser

will leave Salem early next week for Palo Alto, Calif., to attend the Stanford university education conference, which will run from July 7 to 11. Conference subjects this year will include curriculum development, mental and physical health, topics which Gaiser said were closely related to activities being stressed in the Salem system.

After a brief appearance in police lineup, during which he was alternately jocular and surly, the prisoner was arraigned in homicide court on a detective's affidavit detailing the slayings.

"During an argument with Mary Gedeon, of the age of 57 years (the defendant), did wilfully and feloniously beat and strangle her to death . . . one Ronnie Gedeon . . . was seized by the defendant who did wilfully and feloniously choke and strangle her to death with his hands . . . the defendant did . . . stab Frank Byrnes (lodger in the Gedeon home) with an ice pick . . . which caused his death . . ." the affidavit read in part.

He was held without bail.
