HUBBARD, June 28.—Funeral services for "Bud" Thompson, 75, who died Saturday, were held from the Canby Funeral Home, this afternoon. Rev. N. Sherman Hawk pastor of the Federated church of Hubbard officiating. Burial was in Hubbard cemetery.

Bud Thompson was born July 26, 1861, in Anderson county, Tennessee, the son of Eliza and Jonathon Thompson. He came to Oregon at the age of 15, settling near Albany.

In 1891 he was married to Martha Lettler at Scio. They made their home near Lebanon for several years. The young couple then moved to Elliott Prairie, and a few years later to a farm near Hubbard. They lived in the Hubbard community for the last 40 years.

One daughter was born, but passed on in infancy.

Mr. Thompson died at the home of his brother-in-law, George Lettler.

She was a granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. R. Massey of Amity.

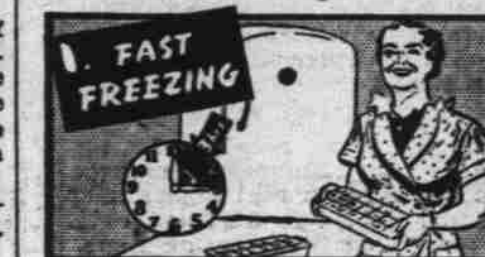

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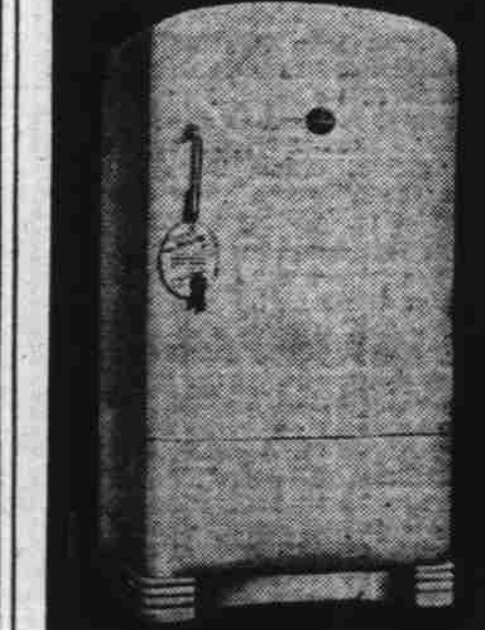
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NOTICE: About July 1 the Salem Water Commission will begin construction of the 12th street water main and hereby gives notice to residents of property on streets where such construction will occur:

East side of 12th St. from Rural to Ferry; west side of 12th St. from Ferry to Marion; south side of Marion from 12th to Capital; east side of Capital from Marion to D; south side of D from Capital to alley in Block 1, Parrish A'd'n; in alleys through Blks. 1, 2 & 3 of Parrish A'd'n. from D to Market; south side of Market from alley in Blk. 2 to McCoy; west side of McCoy from Market to Hunt; north side of Hunt from McCoy to Capital; east side of Capital from Hunt to The Road; east or west side of Fairgrounds Road from The Road to Highland; and east or west side of Pacific Highway from Highland to Gregson.

In general all pipe will be placed near the street curb and the purpose of this notice is to enable residents to remove or protect trees, shrubs or other things of value which might be damaged during construction.

It will be our policy to protect and leave undisturbed all parking strip improvements insofar as it may be practical and economical to do so.

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
