Oregon City's Golfers Lose

Most Matches Close; Bob Taylor Shoots Sub-Par to Beat Scharbach

The Salem Golf club 20-man team defeated a like squad from Oregon City by the decisive score of 44 to 16 on the Salem course Sunday. The competition, however, was closer than the score indicated, points being divided in all but seven of the matches.

The feature contest was the No. 1 match between Bob Taylor, former Salem city champion, and Scharbach, Oregon City champion. Scharbach toured the unfamiliar course in even par figures with a 36 on each nine, forcing Taylor to score a birdie on the ninth hole to halve the first nine and another birdie on the 18th to win the match with a medal of 71. Taylor had five birdies and an eagle but at other times ran into trouble.

The Oregon City men expressed appreciation of the hospitality shown them here and declared the Salem course was in the best condition they had ever seen it. The Salem club's next match will be at Oswego July 11.

A GREAT player in a drab setting, Roy "Beau" Bell of the Browns deserves a world of credit for his inspired playing.

Bell has been consistently good this season, laughing at the jinx that stops most freshman phenoms in their second big league campaign. The St. Louis slugger qualifies as a sophomore star, since 1936 was his first full season in the majors. Two

years ago he played in 76 games with the Browns, but was sent back to the minors on option, and had to make a fresh start in '36. Last year many experts considered him the ranking young star of the year, despite the fanfare of publicity accompanying Di Maggio's debut. The 1936 figures seem to indicate an edge for Beau, at that.

Bell made more base hits than the Yanks' Italian phenom, hit 21 points

higher, and batted in only 2 less runs while playing with a weak hitting team. On the other hand, Di Maggio supporters can point out that Joltin' Joe hits more home runs and can throw and field better than the Browns' Bomber.

To us it looks like even-Stephen, take your pick. On a first division team the Beau might even outshine the Di Mag.

State Diamond Squads Coming

Silverton Ready as Host to Semi-Pro Tourney Opening Saturday

SILVERTON, June 28.—Night baseball will make its debut in the mid-Willamette valley Saturday night when the Oregon semi-pro baseball tournament opens.

Sixteen teams, their ranks filled with young ball players on the threshold of professional baseball careers, will battle on the grass-covered field under the blinding floodlights for the Oregon crown.

Sellwood's speedy team from the Greater Portland league meets Molalla's dark horse entry in the opening game of a double-header. The second game Saturday night promises to be a raw meat affair, with Silverton, the host team, tangling with its arch-rival, Woodburn.

Woodburn's slightly favorite on the basis of a recent state league victory over Silverton, Woodburn rules as a slight favorite to topple the host club.

Selling a 10-day into the double-elimination playoff, the schedule calls for double-headers both on the afternoons and nights of July 4 and 5, after which all games will be twin bills at night. Pacific Fruit meets Southern Pacific the afternoon of July 4 and Hop Gold meets Consolidated Freight. Toledo vs. Oregon City, and St. Helens vs. Portland Woolen Mills provide the night fire works.

The final first round games are between Dallas and the Mantle club, and Reliable Shoe and Cornelius, the afternoon of July 5. That night the second round starts, with Silverton, Molalla, Sellwood and Woodburn again taking the field. The opening round winners meet, and likewise the losers under the double-elimination system.

Tough Opponents Slated Those included in the Silverton, Hop Gold, Toledo and Reliable Shoe, face unusually tough opponents in the opening round.

Woodburn's fast fielding and heavy-hitting club will go to Silverton with a five-man mound staff composed of Bill Ann and Jack Criswell from Willamette university, Lee Fallin from Salem high, Buck Welton from Mount Angel, and Jack Becker.

Hop Gold's well balanced team will be pressed to the limit to drop Consolidated Freight, which has Don McDaniel, Hughie Day, John Linde, Scott George and T. Bravajich for pitchers.

The addition of big Otto Houdek of Oregon State college gives Oregon City a chance of upsetting Toledo's favored team. Other Oregon City twirlers are Lyle Pettijohn, Fred Hutchinson and Victor Weitzel.

Herb Sahnow's return from the Western States league gives Cornelius a mound ace who may tame the big bats of Reliable Shoe's veterans in the first round.

Steele Skinny Kid.

"Boxing, if handled right," Jack said, "is a good, clean game. It's a marvelous way to build yourself up. I remember Freddie Steele, who was a kid in Tacoma appearing in openers on some of the cards. He was a skinny, scrawny kid and if anybody told me that some day he'd be middleweight champion of the world I'd have laughed in his face. But he trained and built himself up and now look at him."

First Is Tourney.

The first card under Jack's management will be a tournament affair, with winners of the bouts being matched with winners from the next card, according to ability. The plan is to make the first card one of ten four-round bouts. Jack says there will be no waiting between bouts with contestants in one event waiting at the ringside while those in the preceding event are battling it out. They will be ready to go with another bout just as soon as one event is finished.

Boxers Wanted.

McCarthy is eager to interview young boxers, even with little experience, and would like to watch them work out. Boys eligible to appear on his cards will be given boxing lessons free and, of course, will receive pay for fighting when they do.
