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volving relocations of the current and its disposition to the public. "Under the proposed setup the Bonneville development will be operated in just about the same manner as any well conducted power system."

"The administrator will find the markets and supply them with power. He will make rates but these must be approved by the federal power commission. The public has a 50-per cent reservation as against private users for a definite period (1940 in the senate bill and 1941 in the house measure) and after that expires the public systems have the first call on all the power even though private interests seek an allocation."

The northwest senators said they were in complete agreement on the measure, including its terms for low uniform rates, or rates uniform within prescribed transmission areas.

Oregon Physician Fought Desperado

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GRANTS PASS, June 29.—(P)—The colorful life of Dr. Austin C. Wright, who carried the scars of Black Bart's bullets and had, in turn left his mark on the California desperado, remained unknown outside a close circle of friends until the publication of his obituary today.

The 75-year-old pioneer doctor died here June 20, and the story of his part in the thrilling chapters of early western history was revealed.

Not yet 21 and waging a losing fight against pneumonia, he came to California as a graduate of the University of Michigan, and established a slender practice among the miners.

At Grizzly Flats, east of Sacramento, where he supplemented his income by serving as agent for the Wells Fargo Express company, he tangled with Black Bart, who specialized in stage coach robberies.

The desperado fled, wounded and without loot after an attempt to rob the office in Wright's charge, but he left the young doctor with wounds that nearly cost him his life, received when the two "shot it out."

Last of Concrete Pipe Is in Place
