## Albany Episcopal Church Observes 84th Anniversary of Its Founding

ALBANY, June 29.—The 84th anniversary of the founding of St. Peter's Episcopal church here was celebrated with fitting ceremonies tonight, Rev. E. A. Coles, rector, has announced that Wednesday morning a celebration of the Holy Communion will be held at 10 o'clock and in the evening a public service will be held in the church, marking the commencement of the new year.

St. Peter's church is one of the pioneer churches of Albany. It is an organized part of the Protestant Episcopal church. The ground on which the church building stands was donated by the founders of the western part of Albany, Walter and Thomas Monteth, among the earliest pioneers of Linn county and who gave much of the land on which other churches of the city are located.

The present church building was erected in 1876, and the bell, one of the sweetest toned church bells in the city, was a memorial of 50 years ago. The first church building is now being used as a parish hall.
