LEBANON, June 30.—Lebanon is welcoming the whistle of both saw mills which have resumed operation after a temporary shut down. The firm was unable to get logs as they had to be hauled over soft roads but improved the time of waiting by overhauling the planer and getting it in fine working order. The Sewell and Wynn mill resumed Monday after a brief strike with a good part of the former force at work. A number of the men of the force voted to accept no raise in wages.

Lakeview Bank Is Sold to Giannini

LAKEVIEW, June 30.—(AP)—The Bank of Lakeview, Lake county's leading financial institution, founded in 1898, has announced the sale of its stock to the Giannini interests of San Francisco, represented by D. O. Hood of Portland.

Judge Arthur D. Hay, hearing an equity case brought by stockholders of the bank, allowed a petition to sell 206 shares of the bank's stock, held by the Bernard Daly educational trust, for \$693.75 a share.

The Daly stock represented 51 per cent of the 400 existing shares, the other 194 shares also being sold.

Trustees for the Daly fund resigned in a body, their successors to be appointed by Judge Hay. The fund will not be placed in the Giannini bank, but will be administered by the new trustees under direction of the circuit court. It was announced: Whether the bank will be consolidated with the existing branch of the First National Bank of Portland was not disclosed.
