Hook Is Found Guilty, Theft

Sentenced to Year, Given Parole on Condition Repayment Made

Luther Hook was found guilty yesterday of larceny of a cattle yesterday afternoon at the close of a trial before Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon. He had waived trial by jury.

Judge McMahon paroled Hook to his attorney, C. S. Emerson, from a one-year jail sentence but conditioned the parole upon Hook's payment of his attorney's fee and his refunding to Joseph Plesner the \$40 Plesner had paid for two heifers of whose theft from Raleigh Harold Hook was ruled guilty. The animals had previously been returned to their owner.

Five and one-half months Hook had already spent in jail awaiting trial will not count toward the one-year sentence should his parole be revoked, the court declared from the bench in answer to an inquiry.

Find Elderly Man Dead in Cemetery

Archer C. Miller, elderly Jefferson resident, was found at 4:30 p. m. yesterday dead at the wheel of his automobile, which had run against a tombstone in the Masonic cemetery east of the town and come to a stop.

Coroner L. E. Barrick reported last night. He attributed Miller's death to a heart attack. The elderly man, believed to be about 73 years old, left his home between 10:30 and 11 a. m. either to visit a son or to practice driving in preparation for being re-examined for an operator's license, the coroner said. When he failed to return by late afternoon, his wife and their daughter-in-law, Mrs. Clarence C. Miller, went to look for him and discovered him in the cemetery.

Relatives told the coroner Miller had been suffering from a heart ailment.

Surviving in addition to the widow and the son, Clarence C. Miller is another son, whose name the coroner did not learn. The body was taken to the Howell mortuary at Jefferson.

University's Role In City Outlined

Cordial Relations of W. U. and Salem Fraised by Baxter at Rotary

Dr. Bruce R. Baxter, president of Willamette university, voiced high praise for the cordial relations between the university and the city in an address before the Rotary club Wednesday. He strongly defended the church-affiliated small college.

"My idea of the ideal institution," said the president, "is one with a chapel in the center and laboratories, library and athletic fields around it."

Specialization has not made unnecessary a broad college training, he said, because people need "the undergirding of cultural courses."

Many Faiths There
While the university is connected with the Methodist Episcopal church it is not run on any narrow sectarian basis. Of the religious affiliations of students 317 were reported as Methodist, 87 Presbyterian, 45 Church of Christ, 32 Congregationalist, 26 Lutheran, 21 Episcopal, 20 Roman Catholic, 18 Christian Science, 18 Baptists.

The Methodist church, while early accused of being little interested in higher education, now has more students in institutions than any other denomination.

Dr. Baxter pointed out also the economic side of the university in the community. He estimated expenditures of \$225,000 by students each year and \$109,200 by faculty and staff.

Vocal numbers were sung by Mrs. Ivan Stewart.

Brown E. Stason closed his year as president. He will be succeeded by J. Lyman Steed.

Service Stations Agree on Charges

A suggested standard schedule of service station prices for the Salem and West Salem area was advertised yesterday by authorization of a large majority of the station proprietors. The schedule is intended to discourage profiteering and price cutting practices such as have occurred in other cities. The stations do not attempt, however, to fix gasoline or oil prices, which are subject to the refiners' regulations.

Operators claimed the suggested list did not mean an increase in prices. Among the prices quoted were a minimum of \$1 for lubricating passenger cars and a maximum of \$2 for larger and more expensive autos. A minimum of \$1.50 was set for car washing.

Former Business Woman Here Dies

GERVAIS, June 30.—Bertha A. Whitcraft, 58, formerly proprietor of neighborhood grocery stores in Salem and Albany, died June 28 in Oakland, Calif., according to word received here today. She was born in Christian county, Ill., July 3, 1878.

The deceased is survived by two sisters, Mrs. L. V. McAdoo of Salem and Mrs. Nellie Haskell of Portland; a niece, Luella Haskell, and three nephews, F. W. McAdoo of Forest Grove, and Westley and Vernon Haskell. She taught school in North Dakota from 1901 to 1904. Since disposing of her business here she has divided her time between Oregon and California. Funeral announcements will be made later.

Cherries of Good Quality Arriving

Rain of Wednesday Is not Harmful but Hail Near Mt. Angel Damages

Deliveries of Royal Ann cherries, just getting under way to the Salem and West Salem barrelling plants, show fruit of an excellent quality and superior to last year. Max Gehlbach of the Oregon Fruit Products company stated yesterday.

Incidentally, it is not reckoned that the downpour yesterday noon did any further damage to fruits, though one farmer from the Mt. Angel district said a severe hail storm beat down corn in a three-mile sweep west of Mt. Angel. Report from Albany indicated a bad hail storm there, but farmers delivering fruit here late yesterday from the Lebanon territory said there was

no storm damage there yesterday.

The cherry loss here is now placed at around 30 per cent of the previous light crop prospects. In the hills districts, where the heaviest crop set on this year, some orchards report no loss at all and others say the loss will be only small. In the lowlands where crop prospects were light even before the ruining June deluge, the loss has run 50 per cent. Combining the two extremes, the Salem growing area is now estimated to have lost only around 30 per cent of its 1937 harvest, instead of around 50 to 60 per cent as talked a week ago.

Cherries which were split have themselves no salvage value, for these have dried and shriveled. On some branches where this condition prevails, perfect Royal Ann cherries are found, and while picking is made harder on account of the two extremes, there is no question as to which cherries are marketable.
