Yankees Keep Ryder Trophy

First Victory on English Fairways Is Recorded by Score of 8-4

SOUTHPORT, Eng., June 30.—(P)—The U. S. Ryder cup team today achieved the goal of an eight-year-long quest when the hand-picked squad of American professional golfers scored the first U. S. victory on British soil, by 8 points to 4, and thus retained the international trophy for at least two more years.

Leading 2 1/2 to 1 1/2 after yesterday's Scotch foursomes, the invaders won five singles matches, tied another and lost two today. The score now stands 4 to 2 for the U. S. in the series.

It remained for Gene Sarazen, who has played in every cup match including the two the Americans lost in Great Britain in 1929 and 1933, to assure the team of retaining the trophy by scoring a sterling one up victory over Percy Alliss.

Three down at the end of twenty-four holes and still three men ahead in the 24th and 27th doubly little Gene finally went out front for good on the short 33rd. There his tee shot hit a spectator and stayed on the green, thus giving Sarazen a chance to hole a 24-foot putt for the duce which won the match.

Dudley Clinches It
While Sarazen's triumph clinched the cup—when Gene came in the winner, it brought the score to 6-4 with only two matches still on the course—it was another veteran, Ed Dudley, who made sure of victory. Dudley's 2 and 1 defeat of Alf Perry, British open champion two years ago, made it 7-4 and killed the last hope of trying the score.

Most decisive victor of the day was towering, slope-shouldered Ralph Guldahl, winner of the U. S. open crown two and a half weeks ago and today conqueror by an 8 to 7 score of Alf Padgham, the British open ruler. Joining him, Sarazen and Dudley as winners were slacker Sam Snead, who routed Richard Burton, 5 and 4, in his international debut, and lanky Henry Picard, with a 2 and 1 defeat of Arthur Lacey.

Denny Shute, two time U. S. P.G.A. champion, accounted for the other, Sam King, a former gamekeeper from Kent. The British winner, Henry Cotton, who defeated 1936 American open champion Tony Manero, 5 and 3; and brilliant young David Rees, Welsh assistant pro, who topped Byron Nelson, 3 and 1.

Interest in the coming races is red-hot among the coast's foremost drivers, according to Claude McKenney and he expects more than 20 grade A machines to take part in the holiday meet.

Savings and Loan Assets Increase
WASHINGTON, June 30.—(P)—The Federal Home Loan bank board has reported assets of 38 Oregon savings and loan associations jumped from \$18,238,000 in 1935 to \$19,967,000 in 1936. Home mortgage loans outstanding increased from \$10,855,000 to \$13,399,000, a reflection, the board said, of 23.3 per cent rise in building operations in the state during 1936.

Accounts of association investments increased from \$16,197,000 to \$17,627,000 over the year.
